

BAD FOR JAPS!**Report That Four of
Their Ships Were
Sunk****OFF PORT ARTHUR****By the Unexpected Sortie
of the Russian Fleet.****A SKIRMISH IN WHICH JAPANESE
WON.**

Liao Yang, June 6.—It is persistently reported here that the Port Arthur squadron made a sortie shortly before dawn Saturday, with the torpedo boat destroyers leading, and found the Japanese fleet quite unexpected the presence of hostile warships, with the result that four of the Japanese ships were sunk during the attack.

Che Foo, June 6.—The Russian consul here has received news that a large Japanese vessel has been sunk by a mine off Talien Wan, believed to be a merchantman.

An Admiral's Mistake.

Paris, June 6.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Matin gives the details of the loss of the Russian cruiser Bogatyr at Vladivostock.

He says that Admiral Jessen, the naval commander at the port ordered a sortie. Captain Stedman, commander of the Bogatyr, objected, on the ground that it would be dangerous to navigate the ship in the prevailing thick fog.

The Admiral repeated the order declaring, that if necessary he would take out the Bogatyr himself.

Captain Stedman retorted that his judgment forbade him to risk his ship in the prevailing conditions. He said he would rather abandon the command. Admiral Jessen took command of the Bogatyr, and shortly afterwards she struck a rock.

Admiral Jessen will be court martialed.

A Skirmish.

Soul, June 6.—The Japanese consul at Gensan wires that during a skirmish which took place on the 3d inst., thirty Japanese soldiers and one lieutenant were killed, and three men severely wounded.

The Russians in retreating burned a number of villages.

The Japanese attacked the Cosacks, killing two and wounding several.

Russians Repulsed.

London, June 6.—The Daily Telegraph's Tien Tsin correspondent wires:

"Four thousand Russians belong to General Stalkberg's brigade, on May 31, attacked 1,500 Japanese occupying a position five miles south of Wafangtien. The Russians were repulsed losing 200 killed and 400 wounded. The Japanese lost more than 100 killed."

IT BREEDS FEAR.

Crumbling Mountain Causing Alarm at Frank, N. W. T.

Frank, N. W. T., June 6.—Recent rains here helped to dislodge huge masses of rock from the shattered summit of Turtle Mountain, and the rumbling and crashing of their descent are beginning to breed nervous-

ness among those who were witnesses of the tragedy of a year ago. Apart from their awe inspiring roar, these small slides are not a source of any real danger. They come from the disintegrated south peak, a mile below the town and the falling rocks never reach the base of the mountains.

DISASTROUS EXPLOSION.

Colorado Miners Killed by Dynamite Purposely Laid.

Colorado Springs, June 6.—An explosion at Independence Station of the Florence and Cripple Creek road in Cripple Creek district this morning, killed 16 miners and injured 9 others fatally.

The explosion was caused by dynamite, which had been placed under the depot platform, and which was set off by an incoming train. The men were waiting to take the train for home. It is believed the plot was laid to catch the men.

OIL REFINERY.

First one in the Province to be Constructed at Once.

INTERCOLLEGIATE SPORTS.

Mount Allison Athlets Led, and U. N. B. Men Were Third.

The intercollegiate sports between teams representing Acadia, Mount Allison and New Brunswick universities, on the Victoria grounds, St. John, Saturday afternoon, proved to be a great success and the twelve hundred spectators had the pleasure of witnessing two maritime province records broken.

Joseph Howe and Walter Jones, both Acadia men, carried off the honors of the day, having broken the records in the running broad jump and hammer throw respectively. Howe jumped 21 feet 11½ in., breaking the maritime record of 21 feet 6 inches. Jones threw the hammer 125 feet 2½ inches, breaking maritime record held by himself, and which he made two years ago, of 122 feet 1½ inches. In the events as a whole, Acadia took first place with a total of 45 points, Sackville second with a total of 33 points, and U. N. B. third with a total of 12 points.

The results of the sports were as follows:

First heat, 100 yards—Howe (Acadia) 1st; Powell, (Mt. Allison), 2d; time, 110 4-5 seconds.

Second heat, 100 yards—Black (Mt. Allison), 1st; Lewis (Acadia) 2d; time, 10 4-5 seconds.

Final heat, 100 yards—Black (Mt. Allison) 1st; Howe, (Acadia) 2d; Powell (Mt. Allison) 3rd; time, 10 4-5 seconds.

High Jump—Powell (Mt. Allison)

1st; Howe (Acadia) 2nd. Height, 5 feet 4½ inches. Squires and Barker of U. N. B., tied for 3rd place.

Running broad jump—Howe (Acadia), 1st; Squires (U. N. B.), 2nd; Marr (Mt. Allison), 3rd; Distance 21 feet 11 3-4 inches, breaking the record of Maritime provinces. Squires also made a fine jump of 21 feet 1 3-4 inches.

220 yards—Howe (Acadia), 1st; Black (Mt. Allison), 2nd; Powell (Mt. Allison), 3rd. Time 24 1-5 seconds.

Hammer throw—Jones (Acadia), 1st; Barker (U. N. B.), 2nd; Howie (U. N. B.), 3rd. Distance, 121 feet 7 inches. Jones afterwards tried for the record and broke it with the excellent throw of 125 feet 2 1-2 inches.

440 yards—Howe (Acadia), 1st; Black (Mt. Allison), 2nd; Powell (Mt. Allison), 3rd. Time 51 3-4 seconds.

Shot put—Jones (Acadia), 1st; Denton (Acadia), 2nd; Barker (U. N. B.), 3rd. Distance, 35 feet 3 1-4 inches.

Hurdles, 1st heat—Marr (Mt. Allison), 1st; Jones (Acadia), 2nd. Time, 18 seconds.

Hurdles, 2nd heat—Howe (Acadia) and Barker (U. N. B.), tied for 1st place; Doe (Mt. Allison), 2nd. Time, 19 3-5 seconds.

Hurdles, final—Marr (Mt. Allison), 1st; Jones (Acadia), 2nd; Barker (U. N. B.), 3rd. Time 18 1-5 seconds.

Pole vault—Marr (Mt. Allison), 1st; Lewis (Acadia), 2nd; Malloy and Squires of U. N. B., tie for 3rd, place. Height, 9 feet 6 1-2 inches.

Mile run—Denton (Acadia), 1st; Atkinson (Mt. Allison), 2nd; Lynch (U. N. B.), 3rd. Time, 5 minutes 46 1-5 seconds.

In the final of the hurdles, Howe of Acadia, who was leading, closely followed by Barker of U. N. B., tripped and fell, causing the latter to fall over him. As a result Barker came in third.
