Made Another Attempt to Seal Port Arthur.

RUSSIANS REPORT THAT THE MISSION FAILED.

Japs' Fireships and Two Torpedo Boats Sunk.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

St. Petersburg, May 3.—It is reported that Vice Admiral Togo made another attempt to block the entrance of Port Arthur last night but failed.

Viceroy Alexieff sent out a section of the fleet to meet the attack and sank eight fireships and two Japanese torpedo boats. The channel is reported to be clear.

The News Confirmed.

St. Petersburg, May 3.—The reports that Vice Admiral Togo had made another attempt to block Port Arthur is confirmed.

Vice-roy Alexieff reports officially that the Japanese sent eight fireships last night to block the entrance of the harbor, but they were all sunk by the Russian torpedo boats and the fire from the land batteries, leaving the channel clear.

The Vice-roy also reports that the Russians sank two Japanese torpedo boats.

Explaining Their Defeat.

St. Petersburg, May 3.—A despatch received by the Emperor from Gen Kuropakin dated noon, Sunday, describes how General Sassulitch ordered the Russian forces at Antung and Kallien Cheng to fall back along the main road towards Feng Cheng.

This movement was protected from the threatened flank attack by men and guns stationed at Potiatensks and Shin Gow villages on the Litaven River.

Here the fighting was protracted and severe. The Russians lost artillery and horses, being obliged to abandon, according to despatch "a few guns."

The General continues "although we were unable to hold our positions we inflicted heavy loss on the enemy."

The Japanese Victory.

Ottawa, May 3.—Consul General Nossé of Japan, now here, has received a special cablegram announcing the great Japanese land victory and confirming all press despatches of the battle in which both sides lost heavily.

Chicago, May 3.—A Daily News special from Kobe, Japan, says: "Details of the heavy fighting in the neighborhood of Chin Tien Chen say that the Russians made a most stubborn resistance to the Japanese advance, but were driven successively out of seven lines of trenches."

London, May 3.—The latest despatches received here confirming the completeness of the Japanese victory on the Yalu could hardly have given greater satisfaction in Tokio than they have done in London. The editorials in the morning papers ring with admiration at the success of General Kuroki's strategy in a manner indicating that Great Britain had been in considerable doubt of the capacity of her ally's troops when matched against the Russian and, despite the lack by Japan of good cavalry to follow up her victory, it is believed she will speedily drive the Russians out of Feng Huan Cheng also.

Few further details have yet been received, but it seems that the Japanese Imperial Guards fought with conspicuous bravery and sustained the brunt of the fighting, losing heavily. Some accounts speak of bayonet charges.

It is evident that the Japanese success is largely due to the superiority of their artillery, the Russian guns being too light.

ST. JOHN UNION TAILORS.

Threaten to Strike Unless Employers Concede Better Wages.

St. John, May 3.—All indications now point to a strike of union tailors in St. John. They have submitted a uniform scale in the making of certain garments to employers, and some of the tailors refuse to coincide with workmen's views. The latter have referred the matter to the International Union. Upon the decision depends whether the men will go on strike. The union men here are in favor of forcing their claim.

CHILD'S AWFUL DEATH.

ROYALTY AT KILKENNY.

The King's Happy Speech to the People.

Kilkenny, April 30.—King Edward and Queen Alexandra, having finished their visit to Dublin, arrived here this afternoon, and had a most hearty reception. The town was filled with thousands of people from the surrounding country. Several addresses were presented to His Majesty. Replying to the address of the corporation, the King spoke of his gratification at the fact that his deep interest in the Irish people was recognized. A closer acquaintance with them, he added, deepened that interest, and increased his desire to promote their welfare. Both the Queen and himself would rejoice to see Ireland take that place in the industrial world which the intelligence and deftness of her people amply qualified her to fill. If his visits to Ireland gave him better acquaintance with the needs of the people and convinced them of his kindly feeling he would be amply repaid.

CAPT. BUCKNAM APPOINTED

A Canadian is Now Adviser to Turkish Minister of Marine.

Detroit May 3.—Word has been received at Detroit of the acceptance by Capt. Ransford D. Bucknam of an appointment as naval adviser to the Turkish Minister of Marine. Captain Bucknam, who for the past two years has been superintendent and navigating officer for the Cramps Shipbuilding Company of Philadelphia, delivered the Turkish cruiser Mecjudia at Constantinople. He is only 32 years of age, and is a Canadian by birth.

Building to Edmonton.

Winnipeg, May 3.—President Wm Mackenzie has let the contract for the construction of 500 miles of the Canadian Northern line to Edmonton. The successful contractor is J. D. McArthur of Winnipeg. The work includes grading, bridging and track-laying. Contractor McArthur says he will reach Edmonton this year if at all possible.

London, Ont., May 2.—James Deacon, a young Londoner who had been a resident in South Africa for some time, contracted consumption and was hastening to his home here to die when he was detained in quarantine at New York.

Despite every effort made by his friends, Deacon was not permitted to leave the quarantine and died there. His funeral took place here yesterday.

The Intercollegiate Meet.

At a meeting of the Athletic Association of the University held this morning in the College Library, the matter of the Intercollegiate sports to be held at St. John in June, was discussed and the action of Mount Allison in refusing to enter on the terms as agreed to by Acadia and the U. N. B., was unfavorably commented upon. It was resolved not to compete against Mount Allison in the sports, unless they agreed to the regulations assented to at the conference by representatives of the other universities. The advisability of asking St. Francis Xavier College at Antigonish to compete in the sports was discussed and it was decided to invite that college to enter in case Mount Allison refuses to take part under the conditions mentioned.
