Clydesdale Stallions Disposed of on the Exhibition Grounds.

The sale of pure bred Shorthorn cattle and Clydesdale stallions, imported from Ontario, commenced on the exhibition grounds at two o'clock this afternoon. A crowd of about three hundred people were in attendance, among the number being noticed Governor Snowball, Hon. L. P. Farris, Ora P. King, M. P. P., Thos. A. Peters, W. W. Hubbard, Judge Ebbett, Dr. N. R. Colter, Hugh McMonagle and many local horsemen.

Ald. Stockford officiated as auctioneer, and up to 3.30 o'clock had disposed of seven Clydesdale stallions. The bidding was not very lively, and the prices obtained were not high considering the excellent class of stock. The result was as follows:

Wealthy Colchester Man's Sudden Death.

Truro, N. S., May 2.—A telephone from Folly village, announces the sudden death of Captain George Campbell, one of the wealthiest men in Colchester county.

During the absence of his wife in Denver, Colorado, nursing her son Edward Corbett, barrister, who is ill, the deceased had been living alone at home, getting his meals at Fraser's Hotel. Not appearing as usual today at noon Mr. Fraser went to his house and found deceased lying dead on the floor. The position of the body and circumstances indicated that deceased was washing himself at the time of death.

Deceased was an elderly man in the vicinity of seventy, and in his early life followed the sea.

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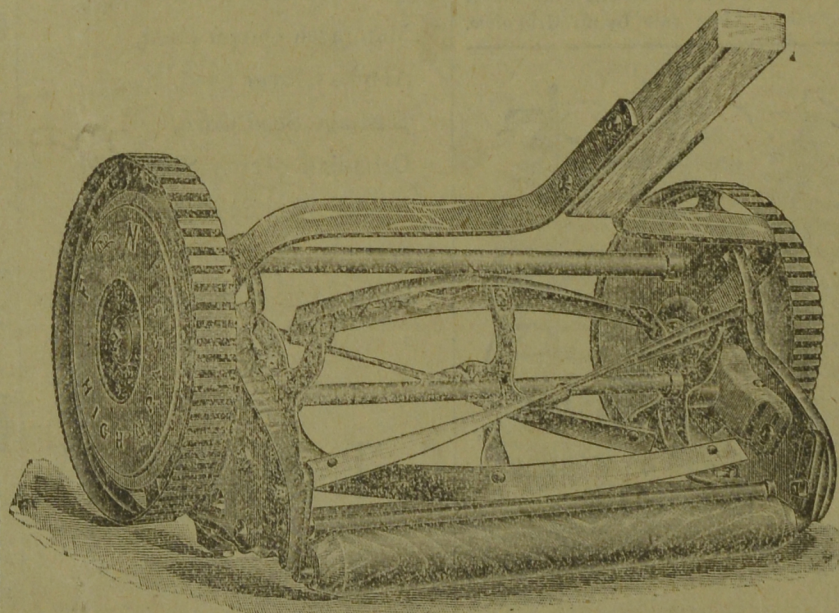
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
