BLACK WATCH BAND.

Will Visit Every Important City in Canada.

The famous Black Watch Band, which is coming to Canada for the Canadian National Exposition in Toronto next August, will go on tour for four weeks, visiting the principal cities of Canada from Winnipeg to Sydney. Mr. Stewart Houston, who brought out the Coldstream Guards Band last season, will direct the tour, which will begin on Sept. 11th. The Black Watch or 42nd Highlanders is the oldest and most famous Scottish regiment in the army. The band is quartered now in Edinburgh castle. Both the brass band, 48 in number, and the pipe band of the Royal Pipers will come to Canada. Major Rose will accompany the band, which will travel everywhere by special train in special sleeping cars, living on board the train.

Hospital Board Meeting.

The regular monthly meeting of the Victoria Hospital Trustees Board was held yesterday, but not much business was transacted. The time for receiving tenders for medical supplies was extended until June 1st, it having been decided that the previous notice given was too short. All the tenders submitted by local druggists were ordered to be returned. Misses Greer and Balloch, who have been serving as probationers, were admitted to the training staff of nurses. The committee on repairs were given some instructions in regard to repairing the roof of the building.

Police Court.

A local horseman was before the police court this morning charged with allowing a colt owned by him to run at large about the streets and public squares. In the absence of Caretaker Yerxa of the Post Office, who lodged the complaint, the case was postponed until tomorrow.

The Dunbar-Hanson case has been postponed until Thursday at the request of the defendant, who has been summoned to Woodstock as a witness in a land case being tried in court.

Potatoe Exports.

Potato shipments to the United States have been unusually brisk here during the past few months, and it is estimated that at least 25,000 barrels have been sent over the border from the counties of York and Sanbury. The largest individual shipper is ex-Ald. W. W. Boyce of this city who has forwarded about 7,000 barrels. Potatoes are now worth from \$1.75 to \$1.90 in the local market, and in Boston they are selling at from \$2 to \$2.25 per bushel.

Young Lady's Death.

Miss Mabel McLean, youngest daughter of the late William and Sarah McLean, died at her home at Burton last night after a short illness. The deceased young lady was the manager of the N. B. Telephone office at Burton and a sister of Messrs. Cecil and H. C. McLean of that place and Mrs. S. J. Kinney of this city. She also leaves two sisters and three brothers living in the United States.

A Bad Fall.

Councillor George F. Banks, of Mangerville, was the victim of quite a serious accident at his home yesterday. He and his son were at work resingling a roof, when the staging gave way, precipitating them to the ground, a distance of fifteen feet. The councillor sustained an injury to the right leg, which will confine him to the house for several days, but had no bones broken.

Equity Court.

Judge Barker presided at the February sitting of the supreme court in equity here this morning. In the case of Alonzo Clifford vs. George W. Merritt, administrator, etc., the decree made at the March term was amended on motion of A. R. Slipp. There was no other business transacted.

DIED AT WOLFVILLE.

Robert Macklin of Gibson, Dies While Visiting Relatives.

Mr. Robert Macklin, an old and respected resident of Gibson, passed away yesterday morning at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Clarence H. Borden, Wolfville, N. S., where he had been visiting for some months. The deceased gentleman, who was seventy-six years of age, was a native of Gibson and resided at that place all his life. He leaves two sons, H. L. Macklin, who resides in the States, and Maurice F., who lives at Gibson; also two daughters, Mrs. Clarence H. Borden of Wolfville, and Mrs. (Rev.) Allen P. Walker of Deray, Tenn. Two brothers also survive, Messrs. Joseph and John Macklin of Madison, Maine. The remains will be brought here by train on Thursday morning at 9.30 o'clock. The funeral will take place from the train and interment will be made at the old burying ground.
