FAMOUS MRS. CHADWICK

Recognized by Penitentiary Warder

AS MADAM DeVERE WHO SERVED TIME

For the Crime of Forgery.

Cleveland, O., Dec. 20.—"How do you do, Mrs. Devere?"

This greeting was addressed to Mrs. Chadwick in her cell at the penitentiary jail this morning by Mrs. L. M. Kissinger, of Columbus, formerly an employee in the women's department in the penitentiary. Mrs. Kissinger was well acquainted with Lydia Devere, when the woman was a prisoner there.

A look of mingled recognition and terror flashed over the face of the prisoner, and instantly she covered her face with her hands. "I don't want to see any women," she cried. Mrs. Kissinger was accompanied by Mrs. Flora Kissinger, her mother-in-law, who was matron in the women's department during the incarceration of Mme. Devere.

"I will take my oath on it," said Mrs. L. M. Kissinger. "She has hardly changed at all since she was a prisoner in the penitentiary."

The visitors looked down upon the woman on the cot, and scanned her closely for a minute longer. Then they left her.

After an interview in the jail the younger Mrs. Kissinger told the story of Mrs. Chadwick's incarceration, while her mother-in-law, an old and somewhat feeble woman, listened attentively supplying certain portions of the narrative when the young woman's memory failed.

"Know her? I should think I know her," said the younger Mrs. Kissinger. "After the experience I had with that woman I can never forget her."

"She is a little fuller in the face and is handsomer than she was. She also wears her hair differently. Now it is pulled up in front. Then she wore it combed severely down close to her forehead. But she has not changed greatly. I identified the lips, if nothing else, and she knew us, too; she looked right at us before she turned her head away."

"My mother-in-law here was matron in the women's department of the penitentiary from 1891 to 1893. She was there when Mme. Devere came. I was employed there and both of us came to know her well."

"She violated with impunity every rule and regulation of the prison. She, by the very strength of her will, assumed the office of assistant matron. In fact, no assistant would have dared take the liberties she took. She would not wear prison clothes. She had a room of her own and in it kept six trunks filled with dresses. She bossed the prisoners about and my mother-in-law was afraid to interfere. She insisted on having her meals served in her room and it was done as she ordered."

"This may seem strange, ridiculous even, to you, but you do not know Mme. Devere—or Mrs. Chadwick, as she is now called."

"She would say: 'You cannot keep me here. I will be pardoned very soon,' and she was. We were glad to see her go. She kept the institution in an uproar by telling the fortunes of the women prisoners. They believed in her power, were afraid of her and would do whatever she told them to do. When she came to the penitentiary she gave her age as 32. That was in January, 1891. She should now be 45. But I know her. I will swear on a stack of Bibles that I know her."

CABINET MINISTER'S WIFE.

Popular Helpmeet of Sir Frederick Borden.

Lady Borden, the charming wife of the minister of militia and defence, is one of the most popular of the "ladies of the cabinet." She was formerly Miss Bessie B. Clarke, of Canning, N. S., and was married to Sir Frederick, then Dr. Borden, ex-member for Kings County, N. S., in 1884, he having been defeated in the general elections of 1882. He re-entered Parliament at the next general election in 1887, and in July 1896, became minister of militia and defence in the Laurier government, a

position he has ever since held. On the coronation of King Edward VII. Hon. Dr. Borden was created a Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, and none has more fittingly adorned the title which came to her through her husband's honor than Lady Borden. Quiet, unassuming, gracious, charmingly natural, Lady Borden is deservedly popular among all who know her and her beautiful home in the Capital. "Stadacona Hall," at one time the residence of the late Sir John A. Macdonald, is the scene of many a delightful entertainment, all the more delightful because so informal. As a hostess she is ably assisted by the daughters of Sir Frederick by his first wife, Miss Elizabeth and Miss Maude Borden. The engagement of the latter to Mr. Leslie V. Macoun has been recently announced. Lady Borden takes great interest in many charitable enterprises, chief among which is the local work of Victorian Order of Nurses. In this organization she is superintendent of relief work, and her kind heart and ready sympathy are well known by all who work with her. While making their permanent home in Ottawa, Lady and the Misses Borden spend the summer season at their summer home in Canning and Lady Borden usually accompanies Sir Frederick on his trips at home and abroad.

THE BISHOP EXPLAINS.

Not an Advocate of Disruption of the Empire.

SPEECH AT LAVAL WAS SIMPLY IN- TENDED AS A LESSON TO THE STUDENTS.

Montreal, Dec. 20.—Bishop Archambault of Joliette, formerly vice-rector of Laval University, says that in the report of his address delivered before the students of Laval last Thursday, a misconception was made of the sentiment he intended to express. "I intended to convey the idea to my hearers that just as the child, when later he becomes a man, throws aside the bondage of youth, gains a larger horizon and a fuller degree of self-control, so perhaps by the force of events Canada may some day be called upon to take her place, a sovereign nation among other nations. Speaking for myself, I should prefer to see Canada a free and independent nation, rather than annexed to the United States. My address was intended to inspire a spirit of discipline among our students, to install the desire to fit themselves for the playing of that role they must assume when Canada, a united Canada, mark you, is on a footing with the other sovereign nations of the earth, which seems her ultimate destiny. There was no thought of appealing to racial prejudice. While speaking, I may have used the term 'French Canada,' but, believe me, it was a slip of the tongue. Not French Canada, not English Canada, but a united Canada, free and sovereign, was the picture I intended to draw. There was no idea of secession. It is simply that in the logical course of events, such a position may be thrust upon her and Canadians must be prepared to play their part."

Mr. Tarte, in La Patrie, discussing the Bishop of Joliette's remarks, as understood before his explanation, said: "We will receive no contingents from abroad. The immigration which reaches us by the shipload is of English, German and Italian origin. It is not and never will be French. It would not be surprising, in fact, to see half a million new settlers reach us every year, as the United States have received as many as a million. It is therefore evident that our proportion of the population will become much less as time goes round. It is useless, it is dangerous, in fact, to indulge in dreams of a nature to turn us from the paths we should follow if we wish to maintain our influence and prepare for the future. Instead of misplacing our energies by dreams and hopes which can never be realized, let us rather apply ourselves to strengthen our position beneath the folds of that flag which is the emblem and the guarantee of equal rights to all. We, for our part, have the profound conviction that the future of the French-Canadian race reposes in their attachment to the present order of things and in their intelligent fidelity we might add in their interested fidelity, to the British empire."

REMARKABLE REVIVAL.

Public Houses Empty and Drunkenness Has Stopped.

London, Dec. 20.—There has been a remarkable spread in the religious revivals which were started at Bolton, Lancashire, on September 4th of this year by Rev. Reuben A. Torrey and Charles M. Alexander of Chicago. The effect of the revival movement is noticeable everywhere and it is stated that the public houses are almost empty. Formerly they were crowded with miners after the working hours. Drunkenness is now almost unknown in the Rhondda Valley in Glamorganshire, where prayer meetings are even held in the mines during work hours. The efforts of the preachers also are directed against the football season, which is now in full swing, and several big matches which would have attracted

the populace of the entire countryside have been called off because the best players refused to participate.

One man has risen head and shoulders above all the rest until his name rings throughout the United Kingdom as the greatest revivalist of the day. He is Evan Roberts, 26 years old, formerly a miner, who goes from place to place, sometimes speaking entire days and nights, praying and singing, not sleeping and not resting. Roberts has been invited by the Nonconformists of London to visit the metropolis in January to conduct meetings. The Rev. Mr. Torrey and Mr. Alexander are active meanwhile. They too announce an invasion of London. They have taken the Royal Albert Hall, which seats 15,000 persons, and there they will conduct a series of meetings, probably at the same time that Roberts is here. In fact, it seems now as if the revival movement has taken hold of England as it never has before in the history of the country.

PREFERS DEATH TO BABY.

So Says Inhuman Chicago Mother Who Abandoned It—Husband of Same Mind.

Chicago, Dec. 20.—Mr. and Mrs. Richard Donovan of 2,253 Ogden Avenue told Judge Mack today that they had abandoned their baby to the care of St. Vincent Orphan Asylum because they "did not want it."

The unwelcome baby came into the world on Thanksgiving Day, after the father and mother had been married two years. The first care of its parents was to get rid of it. Mrs. Donovan took it to the orphanage, where she told a pitiful tale and left it with \$25 to pay for its support. Dr. Frances B. Wilkins, who attended Mrs. Donovan, did not approve of this desertion, and had the parents summoned before the Juvenile Court.

"If you force me to take back the baby I'll jump into the lake," said Mrs. Donovan to the court. "I didn't want it, and I do not love it. I won't take care of it. I'll kill myself first."

"No," said Donovan, "we do not want the baby. We wished no children. As soon as it came we decided that the best thing we could do would be to put it in an institution where somebody might adopt it."

CODE FOR COURTSHIP.

Strict Rules Laid Down by Priest.

Wooing a Serious Matter and Should Not be Continued Longer Than Eight Months.

Latrobe, Pa., Dec. 20.—Rev. Angelo Rauber, stationed at the Monastery in Cincinnati, has charge of the instructions at the annual retreat of St. Xavier's Academy here, which is being attended by many members of the alumnae at Pittsburg, all women. Father Angelo has laid down a rigid line of courtship, as follows: "Courtship is a serious proposition for the responsibilities of marriage. It should not continue longer than seven or eight months. It is the duty of most mothers to ascertain the intentions of young men."

Father Angelo expressed positive views. He said the girl of today has so much freedom that there is constant danger of her. He does not approve of the family deserting the parlor when the young man calls, nor would he permit of dark corners or dim parlors. The hours should be from 8.30 to 10.30 o'clock, no longer, and with no additional half-hours in which to say goodbye. He does not believe that the young sweetheart should sit close on the sofa, so engrossed in their happiness that they forget the flight of time, and the fact that they sometimes forget and hold hands he does not approve of it at all. He would have others present during the young man's call.

"Avoid late hours, buggy rides and walks through lonely places," Father Angelo said. "Courtship is for the purpose of learning the disposition and qualities of the one you intend to marry. The young woman should find out if her suitor drinks or gambles, and whether he is a gentleman. And as the young man seeks to learn her temper and conduct, he should see her home with her family and friends."

RGAND FALLS MAN

Stabbed to Death at Montreal by an Italian.

Grand Falls, Dec. 20.—Word has been received here from the authorities in Montreal that Cyprien Beaulieu, the young man from Grand Falls, who was stabbed by an Italian in a street car in Montreal on Thursday, was dead from his wounds in the Montreal General Hospital.

His assailant, the Italian, was brought before him, lying in a cot in the hospital, and Beaulieu unhesitatingly identified him as the man who had stabbed him.

The dying man then made an ante mortem statement, telling how when a friend got on board the car, he moved up against two Italians, one of whom struck him and immediately afterwards stabbed him in the stomach and shoulder.

The young man's parents, who reside here, are heart-broken over the fatality. His body will be brought here for interment. The murdered man is about twenty-three years of age, and has always borne an excellent character. He was a skilful carpenter, and about a year ago went to Montreal, which offered a wider field for work. His father, Remi Beaulieu, has just received a telegram stating that the Italian has been charged with murder, and that the body of his son would be shipped home for burial.
