NO EMPTY SLEEVES.

The Boston Globe is authority for the statement that the most eloquent stump speech on patriotism is an empty sleeve. Here is a most valuable pointer for the Tories of Canada who are trying to inaugurate another patriotic and loyalty election campaign in this country, but the difficulty for them will be to find the empty sleeves, and if they were able to make such an exhibition, they would not be able to keep both hands on the Union Jack.

Empty sleeves are scarce articles in the Tory party, although they talk glibly about the defence of the Empire, and the necessity of Canadians girding on their armor to fight in any part of His Majesty's broad domains, when they had the opportunity to send Canadians to war they did not do so. In all her troubles during the Tory regime from 1878 to 1896, the Empire had no assistance from Canada, and it was left for a Liberal government to provide men and means for the Empire's assistance when war raged in South Africa. Had the Tory leaders and their abettors gone to war and given a practical exhibition of their loyalty and patriotism they might now be able to profit by the Boston's Globe's suggestion, and display their empty sleeves throughout the country but they did nothing of the kind, contenting themselves with the usual lip loyalty with which they seek to electrify the country at each succeeding election.

Hon. Mr. Fielding, who was in St. John yesterday, when asked by the Sun for information on political questions, especially as to the probable date of the federal elections, suggested to the reporter: "Just invent something—anything will do—and say that I said it." Mr. Fielding knows well the Sun's facility for setting afloat political fiction, and his suggestion was unnecessary. It's a poor day in the Sun office when some sort of a political non-reliable rumor cannot be put in circulation.

A representative of the Herald who had the opportunity of personally meeting and conversing with Sir Wilfrid Laurier last week, bears testimony to the fact that the premier is in excellent health and spirits, a little tired from the exactions of the long parliamentary session, yet in fine fettle, and ready for his active duties. Sir Wilfrid, with Lady Laurier is resting at the beautiful summer home of Senator Casgrain, in Carleton, Bonaventure County.

The rumor is revived that the Duke of Marlborough may be appointed governor general of Canada. The Duchess is a Vanderbilt and with her great fortune would be able to make things hum for society circles in Ottawa.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson is at Moncton attending to official duties, and will probably come to Fredericton next week in connection with the formal transfer of the Canada Eastern railway to the government.

Toronto, Aug. 26.—At the morning session of the C. M. B. A. it was decided to appoint two chartered accountants to take the place of the present finance committee as auditors.

A proposal to form distinct councils for: 1st, Ontario; 2nd, Quebec; 3rd, the Maritime Provinces; and 4th, Manitoba and the Northwest Territories, caused considerable discussion, and occupied the rest of the morning, but was finally defeated.

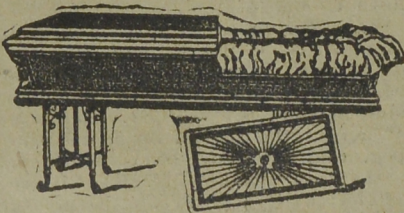
