WHAT ARE FROGS' LEGS.

U. S. Treasury Department Calfes Them Poultry.

Washington, Feb. 4.—Secretary of the Treasury Shaw issued orders to collectors of customs at all lake ports that dressed frogs feet from Canada shall not be admitted free of duty. For some three months the department has been wrestling with the conundrum as to whether frogs legs are dressed poultry within the meaning of the Dingley law, or something else. The Secretary turned the matter over to the customs division for an answer. A letter was written to the auditor of the treasury who raised the question that under what is known as the "similitude" section of the tariff law frogs legs were to be classed as dressed poultry, and duty was to be assessed on them at the rate of five cents a pound.

"SAVE MY DOLLIE."

Pathetic Incident at the I. C. R. Wreck.

Millford, N. S., Feb. 4.—While strong men were wielding axes and the loud tumult about the scene of the wreck as the work of the rescue was proceeding, a little girl aged six, the daughter of Mrs. Morrison, with her face bleeding and her hand hurt, waist deep in debris, called to one of the men who had perished in through the broken window:

"O, mister, please save my dollie, don't let her get hurt."

The child's pathetic appeal almost moved the men to tears, and they lost no time in removing both the little girl and her doll to a place of safety.

Increase in Mounted Police.

In view of the largely-increased sphere of operations of the Northwest Mounted Police, and the immense area of territory which they now have to patrol, the force is to be augmented by 100 men. At present the police number 800, of whom 500 are in the Northwest and 300 in the Yukon. The force have never been numerous enough for the vast region they have to oversee and maintain order in, but with the addition of the Yukon to the territory to be policed and the establishment of posts on the Arctic Ocean and in Hudson Bay an increase in numbers becomes imperatively necessary.

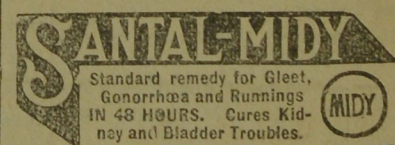

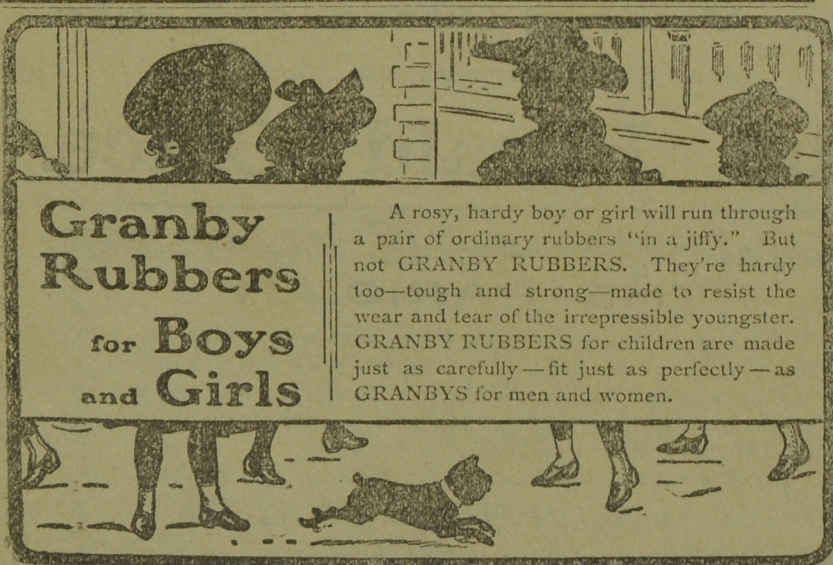
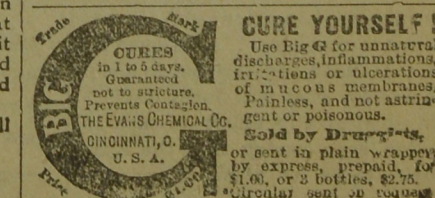
