Liberal Leader to be Given a Great
Demonstration Tonight.

Montreal, Feb. 6.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier
will arrive here this evening from Ottawa,
and later will address a monster meeting
in favor of Mr. Gervais' candidature in
St. James division.

The largest political demonstration to
be held in the city since the last general
election will take place tonight, when all
the Liberal clubs will unite to tender a
reception to Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

A meeting of the officials of all the
Liberal clubs was held yesterday after-
noon, and preparations were made for the
demonstration.

It was decided that the clubs should
meet Sir Wilfrid Laurier at the Bona-
venture station, and that a torchlight
procession be held to the Monument
National.

The speakers at the demonstration will
be Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. L. A. River,
Liberal candidate in Hochelaga; Mr.
Honore Gervais, Liberal candidate in St.
James; Hon. L. P. Brodeur, Hon. R.
Prefontaine, and Hon. R. Lemieux.

STOVE EXPLODED.

Set Fire to the House and
Injured the Tenant.

EXCITING EXPERIENCE IN A NORTH
SYDNEY KITCHEN.

Result of the Extremely Cold
Weather.

North Sydney, N. S., Feb. 6.—Last
evening the pipes in the kitchen of the
residence of Dr. M. T. McLean, Sumner
street, were frozen up.

This morning the fire in the kitchen
was kindled as usual. About eight
o'clock the Doctor, who was about to
leave to visit a patient, was in the kitchen;
when he noticed steam rising from the
stove.

This was followed almost immediately
by a terrific explosion, which blew the
stove to pieces, scattering fragments of
iron and live coals all over the kitchen
and shattering the windows of the room.

The doctor himself was struck in the
knee by a piece of iron and badly hurt.

Live coals set fire to the woodwork, in
a short time the room was ablaze, and
had it not been for the prompt response
of the firemen, the house would have
been destroyed.

As it was the kitchen was gutted and
the rest of the house and furniture badly
damaged by smoke and water. The
house was the property of Miss Ormond,
who had a thousand dollars insurance.
