OUT OF THE MISTY PAST.

Mr. Tarte and Mr. Foster Exchange Pleasantries.

A ROLICKING NIGHT OF FUN AT THE CANADIAN CLUB.

Advantages of Trying Both Parties Reviewed.

Toronto Globe: Two men with a past—Mr. Tarte and Mr. Foster—ex-Ministers of the Dominion government, were guests of the Canadian Club Wednesday night, and the pleasantries they indulged in at each other's expense caused the best fun the club has had for many a day. The discussion was started by the President, Mr. Percy Parker, in a serious enough way, when he welcomed Mr. Tarte as a representative French-Canadian. Mr. Tarte launched out in a patriotic dissertation on Canada's future, which owing to her resources was irrevocably bound up with the empire, as the market and co-operative source of defence. To reach our destiny Mr. Tarte commended the adoption of the Chamberlain policy.

Those of us who have been Ministers of the Crown," he said in first referring to Mr. Foster's presence, "and who may get there again—(Laughter) are in a position to tell you more about the United States than you know." He then quoted his experience to show the Americans' desire for the annexation of Canada. We should not become an independent nation, else the United States would find some means of repeating the story of Panama.

FORGET THE PAST.

"We do not know enough of Canada," Mr. Tarte said a little later. "Before I became a minister I thought I knew my country—I did not know it. I started travelling all over the country. When my friend—turning to Mr. Foster—"was in the House of Commons he reproached me for travelling too much. (Great laughter.) I was travelling in private cars. (Renewed laughter.) Let me say, I have not travelled enough. It is through my travels that I have made up my mind that this country has a great future, and that in order to compete with our neighbors we must take a leaf from the book which they have written." (Applause.) Before sitting down Mr. Tarte quoted an unnamed English M. P. in Montreal on Tuesday objecting to Mr. Foster's speaking in England, and announced that he would start a Canadian Club among his compatriots in Montreal.

THE WANDERER WELCOMED.

Mr. Foster rejoiced to be present and hear "my friend—never my enemy. We have had passages at arms once in a while. Perhaps sometimes he got the better of me; maybe once in a while I got it into him. However, I don't think we ever got fighting mad. (Laughter.) When he was travelling so much I am not quite sure I would have been better pleased if he had travelled still farther. (Renewed laughter.) As he did come back, I read a lecture on his being so expensive. (More laughter.) You have had a wise man to talk to you tonight," Mr. Foster continued; "wiser than he was."

Mr. Tarte—Not very much. (Laughter.) Mr. Foster—I wonder if I dare indulge in a little fight. What do the Germans have? The young German student goes out equipped with his knapsack and his health and brains. He wanders about two or three years gathering information, gathering everything, meeting all kinds of people, getting acquainted with the world. Then he comes back to his fatherland to do better work than ever before. (Cheers.) Gentleman, is it necessary to make the application? (Loud laughter.)

IN THE ELYSIAN FIELDS.

"Coming out of the apprenticeship, the

college of journalism—a most excellent school—he (Mr. Tarte) approached the broad fields of that country of Liberal-Conservatism. He wandered through it and he saw many things that I never saw there. (Laughter.) He learned many things that even I did not get there. He was not satisfied. There was another country that he thought he would explore. Well, I can see him on the river bank, making up his mind whether he will venture into the foreign, and to him up to that time, forbidden country. But he plunges in, passes over and lands on the other bank. You observe he learned. He gets into the very midst of the Elysian fields. (Laughter.) The warm, soft breath of summer air fans his brow. He has the light of power, he has that feeling of being at the centre, the heart of things, and seeing just exactly how the wheels go round. (Renewed laughter.) Now, he has finished his years of wandering.

COMES BACK—HOW FAR?

"Wiser and stronger, having seen the insides of both of these countries, knowing their beauties and their deformities, their strength and their weakness, he comes back—how far? I do not know. (Loud laughter and cheers.) But this much I do know. He comes back a stronger man than ever he was before. (Hear, hear.) And he, representing the French race in this country and a Canadian, stands with the other ex-minister representing the British race, and also a Canadian, and both with one purpose, with many ramifications, but one purpose—to build up a great country here, under the aegis of the British flag. (Cheers.) That is enough for me. I do not question any further. I think he will do stronger, better work for Canada than if he had not had this experience.

AN AWFUL EXAMPLE.

"But, oh, young men, don't take from this that I am urging all of you to undertake these years of wanderings. (Laughter.) Whilst it has not harmed my friend, it might do great damage to others. (Renewed laughter.) Perhaps it is wise to stay pretty well to one country, but if we find a man of strength and purpose who is willing to wander and roam wherever he can anywhere, let him do it, in heaven's name. He will get at the right place afterwards, and will do better now than ever before. (Laughter and cheers.) Now, Brother Tarte," said Mr. Foster, "I am glad to see you here." (Laughter.) I am always glad to hear him speak, because he always says something that he believes, and he means what he says. (Hear, hear.)

Mr. Foster justified his speaking in England by the receptions he had had, and, remarking that the race cries had passed away in Canada, appealed for a serious consideration of our problems.

"I rise to defend my travels," said Mr. Tarte, in opening his reply. "I do not regret any of them. The man who has not travelled does not know as much as I do." (Laughter.) Proceeding, he advised his hearers not to believe there is good in only one party. "That is a big mistake. (Hear, hear.) It is an awful mistake for young men, especially." (Loud laughter.) He closed with an appeal for the development of our transportation facilities.

Ogdensburg, N. Y., Jan. 7.—The village of Saranac Lake is excited over the tragic death of one of its most prominent and wealthy citizens, which occurred last night. Carl Gordon, a brother-in-law of Daniel Hanna, son of Senator Mark Hanna, of Ohio, spent last evening with a party of friends bowling. He returned to his

home about eleven o'clock. It was his custom to keep a loaded revolver under his pillow. It is not exactly known how the accident occurred, but the weapon was in some manner discharged, the bullet entering his cheek, and passing out through the top of his head, killing him instantly. Gordon was 28 years of age, and leaves a wife and two small children.

Indian School Destroyed.

Fort Qu'Appelle, N. W. T., Jan. 7. The Indian Industrial School near here was totally destroyed by fire today. The blaze started about 12:30 o'clock in a room where the lamps are stored and got beyond control within a few minutes. There were over 200 Indian boys and girls at the school, and it is creditable to the staff that not one was injured in any way.

Father Hugonout, the principal, and Mr. S. Warden, his assistant, lost all their personal effects. All the main building and wings are destroyed, and it is estimated that the loss will be over \$40,000. The children are being taken care of at the Roman Catholic Mission and by neighbours. Several sick children were in the hospital ward, and were saved after some difficulty. The school was the largest in the Territories and situated in a pretty spot in Qu'Appelle Valley near the lake, and has always been a favorite place for visitors.

DEATH ON THE BRIDGE.

A Party of Indians Run Down at Lachine.

Montreal, Jan. 6.—The St. Lawrence bridge at Lachine claimed two victims last evening, and three others are in a precarious condition. Five Indians were walking across, when a C. P. R. freight train came along. As soon as the train approached the Indians sat down on the side of the bridge, but unfortunately they did not sit near enough to the edge. Two of them—John Jacobs and Frank Morris—were instantly killed. The other three escaped with injuries more or less serious. Lee-Cross-the-River was hurled down the embankment, and lay at the foot until this morning, when he was picked up in a half frozen condition. It is thought that the men were struck by the storm shield of the locomotive.

The Indians, it appears, were in the habit of crossing the bridge to their work at the Dominion Bridge Company shortly before 7 o'clock in the morning. In the afternoon at 5 o'clock they returned by the bridge to their homes at Caughnawaga. The crossing was forbidden by a sign which was posted at the entrance of the bridge by the C. P. R. The Indians, in spite of this sign, were in the habit of crossing daily, so the company placed a constable on the bridge to prevent them. This had not the desired effect, and the Dominion

Bridge Company finally got permission for them to cross without interference. An investigation will be held.

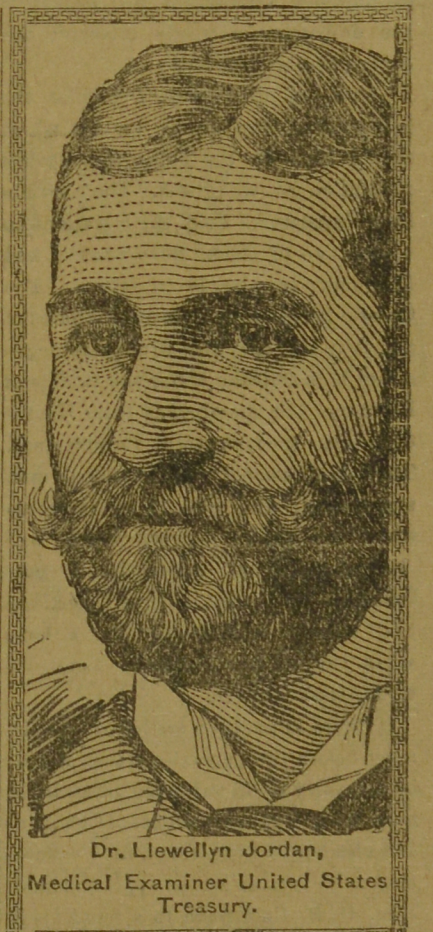
