

JAPS GOT THERE

Repulsed Russian Attacking Force,

KILLING QUITE A FEW.

Important Japanese Movements.

PORT ARTHUR ATTACKED.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Liao Yang, June 10.—The Russian force at Saimatz engaged Japanese advance.

The Russian infantry advanced steadily pushing the Japanese from their position, but their attack gradually developed strength, and the Russians finding themselves in the presence of an overwhelming force, retired in good order.

The Russians losses were four officers and 100 men killed or wounded. Russian observers think the Japanese losses more.

The Japanese are reported as attempting a debarkation north of Sen Yu Chen, from ten transports protected by two warships.

General Kuropatkin is expecting reinforcements, which as soon as they arrive, will advance from Liao Yang and important developments are expected.

Persistent reports are in circulation of a battle at Port Arthur the place being attacked both by land and sea. Nothing definite is known however, except that an attack by Japanese was unsuccessful.

Important Operations.

Fusan Korea, June 10.—The first Japanese army has recently been in an engagement in most important operations.

For two days past four columns have been reconnoitering the roads towards Liao Yang, Hai Cheng, Saimatz and Siu Yen, and have occupied towns on those roads, driving the Russians, numbering several hundred, from each after sharp fighting. The Japanese casualties are 65 men killed or wounded.

OUT ON STRIKE.

Quebec Paper and Pulp Mills Tied Up.

Sherbrooke, Que., June 10.—The three hundred employees of the Royal Paper Mills at East Angus, struck work last evening, and both the pulp and paper mills are idle today.

The men demand that they be paid every two weeks, instead of monthly as has been the custom. They also set forth an alleged grievance against the superintendent of the paper mills.

A conference between the strikers and the officials of the company has been arranged.

METHODIST DISTRICT MEETING.

Business Transacted at the Taymouth Gathering.

The ministerial session of the Fredericton District of the Methodist church was opened at Taymouth on the 8th inst.

There were present the Revs. J. Crisp, chairman, Jabez A. Rogers, D.D., George B. Payson, John J. Colter, S. T. B., Robt. S. Crisp, W. W. Brawer, A. D. McLeod, Matthew R. Knight, M. A., Financial Secretary, A. Harry Harrison, B. A., and Spencer Crisp, a local preacher.

After singing the reading of the Scriptures and prayer by two of the brethren, the chairman expressed the gratitude to God for the mercies of the year and paid a tribute to the memory of the late Rev. Silas James, who since the last meeting

has been called to his eternal reward. Several of his brethren bore testimony to the remarkable success that attended his ministry of nearly 33 years.

The Rev. W. W. Brawer at his own desire was granted leave of absence for another year and the district expressed the hope that he would accede to the request of his brethren for assistance in their work.

At the afternoon session in addition to the above ministers there were present Messrs. C. A. Sampson, Asa Burpee, William Munro and Rogers. The financial interests of the different circuits were then considered.

In the evening the reports of the Sunday schools were read in the presence of a large congregation and earnest and impressive addresses were delivered by C. A. Sampson, and Dr. Rogers and W. W. Brawer.

At the Thursday morning session the following resolution was moved by Rev. J. J. Colter and seconded by Rev. W. W. Brawer:

Whereas, The establishment of the Kingdom of God on the earth is the end for which the work of the Christian church is carried on, and since this is hindered by divisions which in the Providence of God seem to be no longer necessary; it is the opinion of this district that the consummation of the proposed union if it could be satisfactorily arranged and it would further the interests of the Lord's Kingdom. After discussion it was passed unanimously.

CHINESE OATH.

Administered for First Time at Police Court.

The examination of Charlie Loy, the Chinaman, charged with stealing \$40 from Fred Wong, was continued before Judge Marsh at the police court this afternoon. Wong Hang, brother of the complainant in the case was put on the stand and being a heathen and unacquainted with the English language, he had to be sworn according to the Chinese custom. After some searching, His Honor found there were two forms of administering the Chinese oath. One to break a saucer and the other to chop the head off a rooster. The latter being impracticable, His Honor sent out for a saucer, which was soon forthcoming.

John Wah, an intelligent Chinaman was sworn as interpreter.

The witness was instructed to kneel down and was handed the saucer which he threw on the floor with a loud crash. His Honor then administered the Chinese oath, a follows: You shall tell the truth the whole truth, and nothing but the truth—the saucer is cracked, you do not tell the truth your soul will be cracked like the saucer. This was interpreted to the witness by John Wah, to which he assented, and then proceeded to give his evidence in Chinese while still on his knees. The evidence was mostly corroboration of that given by Fred Wong. The case will be continued tomorrow.

MACADAMITE METAL CO.

A factory has been secured at St. John and operations will be started there as soon as possible. This afternoon and evening the directors and friends are being entertained by his Worship Mayor Palmer at the Birches.

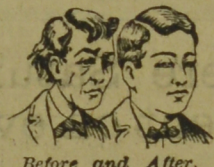
Several ministers are anxious to see the deal consummated, but it is said Mr. Fielding is the stumbling block.
