TIBETANS FIRE ON BRITISH.

Road to Lhasa from the Karo Pass Strongly Held by Natives.

Gyang-Tee, Tibet, May 4.—A report just brought by a mounted infantry dispatch rider says that the farther side of the Karo Pass, on the direct road to Lhasa, is strongly held by the Tibetans, some of whom were drawn from the late garrison of Gyang-tee fort.

Our reconnoitring party, after crossing the summit of a pass and descending a short way, saw the road barred by a wall, and suddenly a heavy fire from jingals and European rifles were opened, bullets striking the ground all around, but causing no casualties.

The number of Tibetans is estimated at 1500 and their position may threaten our line of communication with Kharg-ma.

Our men made no reply to the Tibetans except two or three shots to keep down the enemy's fire during the retirement.

This action on the part of the Tibetans finally disposes of the possibility of any useful purpose being served by the visit of the Amban, from whom Col. Young-husband has received no further communication. It suggests, indeed, that the only object of the visit is to gain further time for the defense of the Lhasa road and probably for the arrival of expected Russian help.

RESCUED FROM DERELICT.

Captain Kept Men at the Pumps at the Point of Revolver.

New York, May 4.—The North German Lloyd steamer Princess Irene, which arrived here today from Genoa, Naples and Gibraltar, brought eight shipwrecked seamen from the Austrian barkentine Mariji, Captain Bartolozzi, which was abandoned in mid-ocean, May 1st. When sighted by the Princess Irene, the Mariji was tossing about helplessly at the mercy of the waves, her hold nearly filled with water, her boats washed away and the eight men of her crew were huddled together on the roof of the afterhouse. The barkentine was a hogshells wreck, and after the crew had been taken off by a lifeboat from the steamer the doomed craft was fired.

Captain Bartolozzi said that his vessel was dismasted in a gale nine days before she was sighted by the Princess Irene and was leaking badly. After nine days of continuous work at the pumps the crew became discouraged at times and tried to abandon their labor. The captain, however, stood over them with a revolver, compelling them to continue. With nine feet of water in the hold and no boats, the outlook was dreary enough. Although food and water were ample, the health of the men gave way under their desperate exertion. The cook was taken ill, and others became so exhausted that they were unable to work. Only four men were fit to do duty when the steamer hove in sight. The Mariji was valued at \$12,000 and her cargo at \$20,000.
