

A SENSATION.

Police of Glace Bay Believe that

A GANG OF COUNTERFEITERS ARE MAKING HEADQUARTERS IN THAT CITY.

Over \$100 Spurious Notes Found in an Ash Barrel.

Glace Bay, N. S., Dec. 8.—A sensation has been sprung in connection with the counterfeit money case.

Mrs. McGillvary, a resident, found \$125 bogus money in her ash barrel.

A young lad named McKinnon attempted to pass a \$5 bill counterfeit in a store and when he was caught he said he got it from Mrs. McGillvary.

The police visited the McGillvary home and Mrs. McGillvary produced the rest of the money and said she found it. She intended turning it over to the police.

She said the bill given to McKinnon was found by her.

The police believe much more counterfeit money will be found and that Glace Bay is the headquarters of a gang of counterfeiters operating all over Canada.

HAD A HARD FIGHT.

Steamer Helena's Experience with St. Lawrence River Ice.

BANDIT ROBS EXPRESS CAR.

Cot \$500, but is Said to Have Overlooked \$200,000—Messenger Shot.

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 7.—A Wells Fargo express car on the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe overland passenger train, west-bound, was entered early today somewhere between Needles and Daggett, and Evan O. Rober's, express messenger, was shot and probably fatally wounded. The way safe was riddled, but the main safe, said to contain \$200,000 in pension money, was not robbed, officials say. Officers of the express company say the robbers secured only about \$500.

The robbery was not discovered until the train reached Daggett.

Word was received late today that a colored tramp has been arrested at Barstow, charged with the robbery.

Being Made in the Bombardment of Port Arthur.

TWO RUSSIAN SHIPS SUNK AND OTHERS DISABLED.

Tokio, Dec. 8, 11 a. m.—Imperial headquarters announce the result of the bombardment of Port Arthur, Dec. 7 as very good.

Many effective hits were made against the battleships Peresviet, Pobieda and the protected cruiser Pallada.

The Peresviet caught fire and at 3.15 the Pobieda listed to the starboard.

The commander of the Japanese land battery reports the Poltiava sunk as reported yesterday. The Retivzan also sunk and the battleship Pobieda is very badly damaged.
