Death at St. Marys.

Mrs. Elizabeth Shepherd, widow of the late Leonard Shepherd, died last night at the residence of Mr. Wellington Boone, St. Mary's, after a lingering illness from cancer of the stomach. She was in her 74th year and is survived by a family of two daughters, Mrs. Clowes Jewett of Millville, and Mrs. Edward Clowes of Macquac. A funeral service will be held at the house at seven o'clock this evening by Rev. W. R. Robinson. The remains

will be taken to Bart's Corner by the Gibson train tomorrow morning for burial. Undertaker Robert B. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

Mr. Moore's Pet Moose.

Mr. Adam Moore the well known guide of Scotch Lake who lately returned from the Tobique woods, says that a young elk moose was a frequent visitor to his camp at Nictaux Lake during the last hunting season. The animal which seemed to be an orphan, made its first appearance along towards the end of September and practically made the camp grounds its headquarters during the following month. It usually passed the night's within a few feet of the camp door, and became so tame that Mr. Moore was able to feed it brush out of his hands. Naturally the creature was an object of much interest to sportsmen who visited the camp and many photograph snap shots of it were taken during the season. When the first snowstorm came early in November the little fellow made tracks for the tall timbers and did not return to the camp.

The Salvation Army's Great International Congress in Moving Pictures.

On Saturday, Dec. 10th, in the Salvation Army hall at 8 p. m., the Salvation Army will present 3,000 feet of moving pictures of their great International Congress, recently held in London, England. Staff-Captain McLean will give a descriptive lecture, and music and illustrated songs will be furnished by Captain Thomas Urquhart of the provincial headquarters staff.

A Needed Change.

A movement is on foot to have the game law amended at the coming session of the legislature so as to prohibit non-resident sportsmen from the United States and elsewhere from hunting in New Brunswick without first employing a resident guide. As the law stands at present non-resident guides are prohibited from pursuing their vocation in this province, but there is nothing to prevent outside sportsmen from going into the woods alone, and killing game. It is contended that these people have no interest in the country and there is nothing to prevent their killing more game than the law allows, if they desire to do so. The proposed amendment to the law will remedy this state of affairs. Premier Tweedie acting surveyor general, is said to be strongly in favor of the change.

New Headlights.

Travelling by night on the Canadian Pacific will soon be even safer than by daylight. For some time past the company has been experimenting with various kinds of lights with a view to adopting that found most serviceable. They have finally decided upon one known as the Pyle electric light, and will soon have all their 800 or 900 engines fitted with this illuminator. This light was tried last winter and proved very successful. It is after the style of a searchlight and enables the engineer to see any obstruction on the track several hundred yards ahead.

The Hay Market.

Farmers are taking advantage of the excellent condition of the roads to haul their hay into market. A great many loads, principally from Springhill and Douglas, were brought in this morning. The best quality of English hay is now worth from \$12 to \$14 per ton.

Upper Gagetown Couple Pass Away Within A Few Hours of Each Other.

Mr. William Boyd, a well known resident of Upper Gagetown, died at his home at noon yesterday, after a lingering illness, and at three o'clock this morning Mrs. Boyd, who has long been a sufferer from paralysis, followed her husband to the great beyond. Mrs. Fanjoy of this city, has been nursing the couple for several weeks, and was at their bedside when the end came.

Mr. Boyd, who was about fifty-three years of age, is survived by four sisters and three brothers. They are Mrs. William Balloch of Woodstock, Mrs. Young of Jersey, N. Y., Mrs. Purvis of Boston, Mrs. Fanjoy of Fredericton, William Boyd of Gladstone, Man., Abner Boyd of Wisconsin, and Jarvis Boyd of Gagetown.

Mrs. Boyd's maiden name was Coy, and she is survived by two brothers, Warren and Amasa of Gagetown, and four sisters, Mrs. Charles Watson of Gibson, Mrs. Currie of Boston, Mrs. Chipman Weston of Upper Gagetown, and Mrs. Howard Weston of Gagetown. The couple leave no descendants.

Mrs. Mary Brooks, wife of Nathaniel Brooks, died at her home, Regent street, last evening at seven o'clock, after a fortnight's illness.
