Heard Eloquent Speeches
from Eminent Men.SIR WILFRID LAURIER AND HON.
GEO. E. FOSTERProposed and Answered the Toast to
Canada.

Montreal, Sept. 23.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier was the principal speaker at the banquet of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association banquet last night. Three hundred attended the function.

Among those attending were Hon. Wm. Paterson, Hon. George Ross, Hon. Geo. E. Foster, Hon. R. H. McCarthy, colonial secretary of the West Indies; Sir Howard Vincent, British M. P. and noted imperialist.

The prime minister proposed the toast, "Canada and the Empire." After introductory allusions to the noted guests present, he briefly reviewed the history of the British Empire.

The empire of England was a galaxy of living nations. In this connection Rome was the dead mother of a dead empire; England the living mother of young nations. But what was to be the new future of these? It had been suggested that a bond of union would be found in a uniform tariff for the British empire. The differences of civilization, of climate and of production made it impossible that we could have for Canada the same tariff as India or Australia or South Africa. But what was possible was, that we could have between the mother land and the colonies, treaties of commerce. The expression was not too strong or extravagant—whereby we could sit down and by mutual concessions, by granting and giving, we could develop the trade of Britain and her colonies to the mutual advantage of all.

He was well aware that the task was not without difficulty. We had some views in Canada and they had views in Great Britain.

We could not have the same tariff, Sir Wilfrid Laurier said, in Canada as in Great Britain, but when the motherland had chosen her policy and we had chosen ours, it should always be possible to come to some conclusion which will strengthen still more the friendly relations existing between us.

He then asked the gathering to drink to the toast, "Canada and the Empire," and resumed his seat amid loud cheers.

Hon George E. Foster.

Hon. Geo. E. Foster said he was disappointed with Premier Laurier's speech. He had expected to hear what Sir Wilfrid had to say about the tariff. He never said a word about it. He was too wise for that. He did, however, give a frank expression, an expression he had made before, that he was not opposed to preferential treaties and that he was not opposed to the colonies sitting down and trying to improve their trade relations.

Mr. Foster then took up the subject of the toast, which he discussed with his accustomed eloquence. It was a theme that held the hearts of Canadians. He said the two points he had in mind were where is Canada today and, where are Canadians? And what did Canadians propose to do for the future? Did we make all we could of our resources? No, because even the most cursory examination would show that Canada's possibilities were unknown to the world of trade and commerce. No man rightly gauged this subject without throwing a vision into the future. What would Canada be in 100 years?

Mr. Foster then discussed the country's natural advantages and in conclusion he spoke of the blend of races inhabiting Canada. His advice was to cast off all prejudice and let none of the parts paralyze the joints of the body.
