The horse cocked its ears, lowered its head, and rubbed its neck against the dog's head. Deutecher tried to call the dog away, but Rex wouldn't leave the horse.

A crowd quickly gathered. A man who knew that Rex had slept for two years in the stall with the horse that had been stolen, suggested to Deutecher that probably Rex had found the stolen horse.

Deutecher then examined the horse, and found that it was his. The animal's tail had been docked, his mane had been shorn, and several identifying spots had been dyed.

The hackster willingly surrendered the horse, which he said he had bought from a Hackensack man, and he was not held.
