Binghamton, N. Y., Sept. 22.—Society folk here are interested today in the accidental disclosure of a secret wedding, the principals in which were separated after leaving the altar.

He met Miss Elizabeth Segler, and they made a trip to Lestershire, where on Aug. 20 they were married by the Rev. J. M. Crandall. The relatives of the girl suspected something and wired for Rathbone's father, who arrived just after the ceremony had been performed and returned with his son to New York.

The young woman when seen today evidently had some second thoughts about the marriage and said that Mr. Rathbone came after his son on her request. She said young Rathbone had "too many strings to his bow" to suit her.

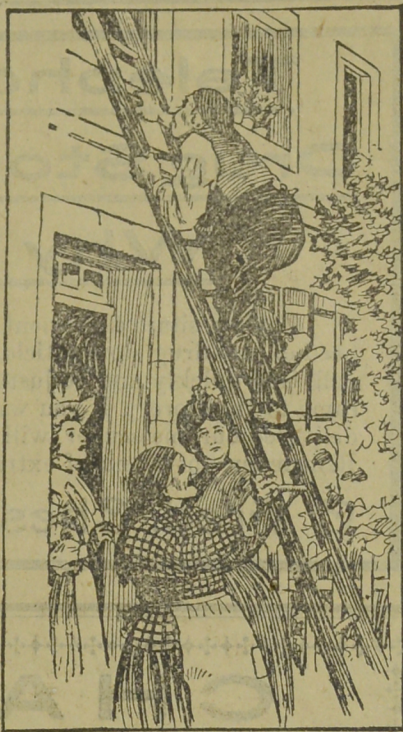
From time to time small allowances are doled out to them—barely enough to live on—but at the end of the year all the profits are divided.

St. Columbian's Sacred Oak.

Hours of Sleep.

Though insomnia is distressing and very bad for health, many people sleep too much. Too much sleep is harmful, and even a newborn infant ought not to be allowed to spend all its time in slumber. Between one and two years of age a child needs sixteen to eighteen hours of sleep; from three to four years it requires fourteen to sixteen hours; from four to six years it ought to have thirteen to fifteen hours; from six to nine years it should have ten to twelve hours, and from nine to thirteen years the proper allowance of sleep is eight to ten hours. After the completion of growth the sleep allowance can be brought down safely to six or eight hours.

Old Orchards.

It is an exceptional case when an old orchard should be filled with young trees. Generally the soil is exhausted by the former growth. The better plan is to set in a new location.

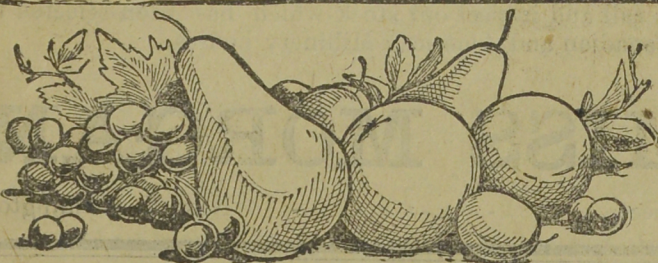
