Funeral of the Late William H. Anderson Very Largely Attended.

The funeral of the late Mr. William H. Anderson took place from his late home on Brunswick Street at three o'clock this afternoon under the auspices of Graham Lodge, L. O. L., and was very largely attended. A short service was conducted at the house by Rev. G. B. Payson, after which the remains were taken to St. Ann's church, where the impressive funeral service of the church of England was conducted by Rev. Canon Roberts.
