

WIFE MURDERER

Escaped Vigilance of His Guards

AND IS NOW A FREE MAN.

Feigned Illness to Carry Out His Design.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Van'leek Hill, Ont., March 24.—Joseph Menard, accused of the murder of his wife two weeks ago, has escaped, and the police can find no trace of him.

At the time of the murder Menard tried to commit suicide, and owing to his serious condition, the doctors ordered him retained in his room, but placed a guard over him.

The doctors were called in last night and pronounced him dying. At two o'clock this morning Menard slipped his guards, and although the country has been scoured, no trace of him can be found.

It is supposed that after hearing of the sentence of death of Goyette at L'Original yesterday, he made up his mind to escape, and feigned serious illness with this object in view.

THE WAR SITUATION.

Russians Deny Everything in Sight—According to Them There's Nothing Doing.

St. Petersburg, March 24.—Despatches received today from General Pfug from Mukren emphatically deny the despatches published in London to the effect that the Japanese have crossed Ta Tung pass or that they had engagements with the Russians, also the statement that the way to Moleff pass, where a strong Russian detachment is alleged to be stationed, is open to the Japanese.

To the same category belongs reports published in London newspapers from Japanese sources of an engagement at Port Arthur March 18, and of an encounter at Chongasayong on the Yalu river, where it was reported 600 Russians were killed or wounded.

DEFENDS HIS SONG.

Author of "The Maple Leaf" Denies It is Doggerel.

Toronto, March 24.—Mr. Alexander Muir, author of "The Maple Leaf" has issued a counterblast to Canon Welch's intimation that his song is doggerel.

"The Maple Leaf may be doggerel," says Mr. Muir, but it contains as devout a prayer for our country as is sometimes heard in cathedrales.

Mr. Muir recalls the fact that three years ago on the 31st of this month, this song was sung by the Canadians at Hart's river, South Africa.

BRIDGE CO. FOREMAN KILLED.

Fell from the Fifth Story of a Montreal Building.

Montreal, March 24.—Alex. Gougeon, aged 35, foreman for the Dominion Bridge Co., fell and was killed instantly at eight o'clock this morning.

Gougeon was foreman in charge of the erection of the steel frame of a building being erected on St. James street for the Metropolitan Bank. In walking along a beam of the fifth story he missed his footing and was dashed to the ground.

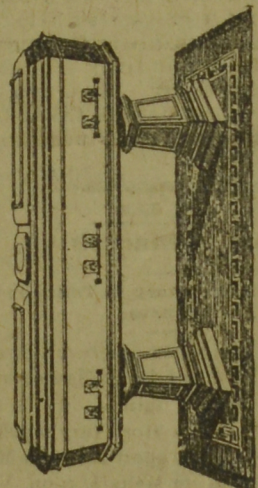
