

HAND TO HAND.

Thursday's Fight a
Most Sanguinary
Conflict.RUSSIANS STUBBORNLY
HELD THE OUTPOSTS.But Were Driven Back to
Main Position.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Liao Yang, Aug. 27.—General Kuroki has joined forces with General Oku, in an attempt to cut the Russian line between Anshan and Liandianshan.

The battle of August 25th raged along the eastern front. A strong Japanese force attacked the Russian position at Miao Pass, eleven miles east of Anshan. Nine batteries of six guns each bombarded Russian outposts at this point and the combat developed into hand to hand fighting.

The Russians stubbornly held the outposts the whole day, falling back on their main positions at night.

The chief artillery engagement was in front of Liandianshan, the Japanese concentrating the fire of ten batteries, and simultaneously advancing on Towintspu, four miles southwest of Liandianshan by infantry and artillery.

The Japanese resumed bombarding early Aug. 26, devoting most of their attention to Liandianshan. The Russian field guns were mostly mounted pieces.

The casualties have not been ascertained.

THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES.

Kantzertun, seven miles southeast of Liao Yang, Aug. 26.—Contrary to the expectations of the Russians, the Japanese are beginning to advance along the whole line of the Russian eastern front. On the morning of Aug. 24 there was a rifle skirmish and the next day the Japanese artillery opened fire. On both days the firing ceased at dusk and the small energy displayed by the Japanese might have been taken to indicate that it was merely a demonstration or a reconnaissance in force. On the morning of the 26th, however, the rifle and artillery fire was renewed with an energy that left no doubt that a severe battle was intended.

The Japanese pushed their attack against the Russian right flank and centre concentrating their fire upon the first battery of the third brigade. Three officers and several men were wounded early in the day but the battery held its position and replied to the Japanese fire with such marked effect that General Ivanoff (who commands the late General Count Keller's corps) sent a congratulatory message to its commander.

The Japanese several times attempted to cross the Tankeho (Lian river?) but only a few succeeded and these were forced to hide in the fields of Chinese corn.

At two o'clock in the afternoon the artillery fire became as hot as it was at Vafangow but it fluctuated considerably and occasionally the Russian fire almost silenced that of the Japanese. Rains fell in torrents at four o'clock but it did not stop the firing and late in the evening several Russian companies moved forward to the attack.

It is not yet possible to state definitely the result of the battle, but it is claimed that the Russians were successful.

There is a prospect of more fighting tomorrow.

IN THE SECOND ROUND.

Jeffries Knocked out Munro in the Prize Ring at San Francisco.

San Francisco, Aug. 26.—Like the veriest amateur in the prize ring Jack Munro of Batte (Mont.), went down and out before Champion James Jeffries tonight in the second round. The man from the mining district made such an extremely sorry showing that the great throng in Mechanics' pavilion roundly booed him as he protested to Referee Graney against the decision that had been given in favor of Jeffries.

The two giants had not been in the ring two minutes when it was foreseen that the aspirations of Munro would be quickly disposed of. The miner was scared and awkward and Jeffries in the first round had him twice on the canvas taking the count.

Jeffries directed his bombardment against the stomach of his opponent and each shot was followed by a blow on the jaw that sent Munro to his knees. Jeffries went back to his corner after the opening round with a sneer and a laugh on his swarthy face, while Munro's seconds busied themselves with smelling salts and restoratives.

When the two came together for the second round the laugh on the champion's visage changed to a look of determination that boded ill to the miner.

Forty-five seconds after the gong sounded Munro was lying on the floor a bloody, bruised mass of humanity, with Jeffries standing over him, ready if necessary, to put the quietus on the championship ambitions of his adversary. The miner was too dazed to rise to his feet and the time keeper counted him out, but the husky man from Montana did not understand his pugilistic star had so early set and the two men, in a moment or two were facing one another and Jeffries landed a terrific blow on the jaw of his staggering opponent.

It was at this time that Referee Graney came forward and ordered Jeffries away, telling him that the fight had ended in his favor. Munro tottered to his corner with blood streaming from his face and fell into his chair dazed and helpless.

His seconds immediately began working on him to revive him and when he came to a realization that the fight had gone against him he rose, and, going over to Referee Graney, began to protest. The huge crowd understood his protesting and a mighty volume of jeering and hissing evidenced the sentiment of the spectators, many of whom had placed money on the miner that he would stay at least double the number of rounds before the champion. From the time the bell rang for commencement of the battle to the time that the count of ten had been uttered against Munro, only four minutes and forty-five seconds had elapsed.

The fight demonstrated if nothing else that the world has yet to produce a pugilist who will displace James Jeffries as champion of the world.

A great throng witnessed the contest. Estimates of the number in attendance ranged from 7,000 to 9,000, and it is believed that the gate receipts approximate \$35,000.

As far as appearances went, Munro contrasted greatly with the champion. His face bore a serious expression and was almost white. He appeared to be ill at ease as his seconds fastened the gloves on his hands.

Hon. M. F. Hackett Re-elected President—Next Meeting at Montreal.

Toronto, Aug. 27.—Hon. M. F. Hackett has been unanimously re-elected Grand President of the C. M. B. A. for a fourth term. The election, which took place last night, was made with great demonstrations of satisfaction by the delegates.

It has been decided to have Mr. Landis' report on insurance systems printed and distributed to local branches. A committee of five, the grand president, grand secretary and three trustees have been appointed to investigate the subject of rates and to make a special report to the local branches four months before next convention.

The other officers elected are:

First vice, Hon. A. D. Richardard, Dorchester, N. B.; Second vice, Bernard O'Connell, Dublin, Ont.; secretary, J. J. Behan, Kingston, re-elected; treasurer, W. J. McKee, Windsor, re-elected; marshal, E. O. Callaghan, Cornwall; Guard, J. J. Winart, Neustadt, Ont.; trustees, Rev. A. E. Burke, Charlottetown; J. A. Coisholm, Halifax.

The delegates continued their session till an early hour in the morning to conclude their business.

The convention yesterday decided to leave its rates as they are for three years more. Meantime the question of increasing the rates will be referred to local branches, so that at the next convention the delegates may come fully instructed.
