

AMERICAN SILVER.

Senators Would Like the Nuisance Abated.

Ottawa, April 29.—The Senate yesterday afternoon adjourned until May the 18th, after a discussion in which the circulation of United States coin in Canada was deplored. The discussion arose on Senator Domville's bill to allow the King's shilling to be a legal tender. Hon. R. W. Scott asked that the bill be allowed to stand, as it was an interference with the currency law.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell drew attention to the fact that the country was swamped with United States money, which should not be received. A larger amount of Canadian silver and small bills was needed to meet the demands.

Hon. Mr. Ellis said that St. John bankers took American silver and withdrew it from circulation.

Hon. Mr. Young drew attention to the grievous similarity between the one dollar bill and four dollar bill at the present time, and urged that they should be altered.

Hon. Mr. Beique spoke of the difficulty experienced in Montreal in meeting the wishes of the immense number of American visitors who came there to spend money.

Hon. Mr. McMullen referred to the bill passed after the close of the American war, when the Receiver-General took United States money at twenty per cent discount. He would like to see the Canadian banks refuse all American money. He also pointed out that American silver was not worth its face value, and reminded the House that in the States Canadian notes and specie were positively refused.

Hon. Mr. Domville agreed to the bill standing over.

Depreciated Silver Currency.

In the House of Commons the same day, Mr. Maclean called the attention of the Minister of Finance to the extensive circulation in Canada of silver currency of the Straits Settlement, which is a depreciated currency. He said there appeared to be an organized attempt, almost amounting to a conspiracy, to unload these coins upon the merchants. The great similarity to Canadian silver, which is worth face value, deceived people, and caused them considerable loss. He suggested that a protest be made to the Imperial authorities against the use of the Sovereign's head upon a depreciated currency.

Hon. Mr. Fielding replied, pointing out the difficulty in the way of protesting against the use of the Sovereign's head on the currency of another portion of the empire. He suggested that if there was such a similarity between the silver currency of the Dominion, and that of the Straits Settlement that people were deceived, the remedy lay with Canada. He pointed out that the currency complained of was not legal tender, but if in practice people accepted it, and there was a dangerous similarity, that could be removed in future issues of Canadian silver.

BISHOP FOR UNITY.

Dr. Courtney Rejoices at the Evangelical Movement.

A notable declaration in favor of Church Union was made at St. George's festival banquet at Halifax recently by Bishop Courtney, who has resigned the Anglican see of Nova Scotia, to assume the rectorship of St. James' Church, New York.

This was the farewell public appearance of the Bishop. He is the patron of St. George's Society, and made an inspiring religious response to the toast, "St. George and Merrie England."

Later in the evening a toast was proposed to "The Patron of the Society and the Clergy of all Denominations." Bishop Courtney, in response, said, amid cheers: "While I maintain the principles of the Church of England as differentiated from the principles of other Churches, I have great satisfaction in embracing an occasion when, without sacrifice of any of these principles, the clergymen of all denominations can be united in this one sentiment: 'I, for one, heartily rejoice to read in the press of a movement to bring some of the Church bodies together, for I am convinced the sooner the principle of unity joins together some of those who are sundered, the more speedily will all be drawn together, and when that comes the world will be won for Christ.'

Rev. Dr. Lathern, Methodist, warmly endorsed Bishop Courtney's words.
