

MEMORY BAD.

Only Could Remember One Wife at a Time.

Yesterday his second wife, who was Miss Annie Morgan, of No. 217 East 98th street, gave Corey's recollection a severe jolt by having him arrested at his first wife's home, No. 98 Morgan avenue, Brooklyn. His wives appeared in the Harlem police court.

Corey is 28 years old and a private in the 71st regiment, N. G. S. N. Y. Annie Morgan Corey told Magistrate Baker that as she sat on a bench in Central Park on July 9 last, Corey, in uniform, spoke to her, made love to her and in half an hour asked her to marry him. She told him she was engaged to another man.

"If you do not marry me I will kill you?" cried Corey.

Venus yielded to Mars. That very night they went to the Rev. C. P. Tinker's house, No. 244 East 86th street, and were married. Corey was the fondest of husbands for two days. Then he forgot and was gone two days. His memory returned and to did he, to arrive on July 13. Forty-eight hours passed, the forgetful Corey lost all recollection of the park bench courtship and subsequent marriage, and disappeared finally.

The too gallant Corey's first wife wedded him in St. Nicholas' church, Brooklyn, in March, 1900. Their small son, Raymond, clung to his mother's skirt in court. This Mrs. Corey said her husband deserted her after a year, enlisted in the 17th United States Infantry, deserted the regiment, was arrested and sentenced to three years' imprisonment. She induced Secretary Root to commute his sentence to eleven months. When he was liberated Mrs. Corey said he went to the Pacific coast, engaged himself to a girl, borrowed \$125 from her father and returned to Brooklyn on June 17.

"What have you to say to all this, Corey?" Magistrate Baker asked.

"I have the worst memory in the world," answered Corey. "I can't remember what happens from one day to another."

"Two thousand dollars bail," retorted the magistrate, "Now you have a chance to brush up your memory."

Our Japanese Agent.

Mr. Alexander MacLean of Ottawa, who has just been appointed Commercial Agent for Canada to Japan, was in his earlier days a prominent newspaper man. He established The Mitchell Reformer in 1861, published The Cornwall Freeholder from 1865 to 1872, was Ottawa correspondent of The Globe from 1872 to 1874, was proprietor and publisher of The Ottawa Times, 1874-1875, and was managing director of The Montreal Herald, 1894-1895. With Mr. J. J. Roger he obtained in 1874 the contract for the Parliamentary and departmental printing at Ottawa, and held it until the Printing Bureau was established in 1883. In the meantime he had turned his attention to manufacturing, and in 1885 established the Canadian Granite Company, and three years later the Ottawa Granolithic Paving Company, of both of which he was president. He took considerable interest in municipal matters, and was an alderman for several terms. In politics he is a Liberal, and was for a term president of the Ottawa Reform Association. He has also been president of the St. Andrew's Society, of the Ottawa Art School and of the Central Canada Exhibition Association.

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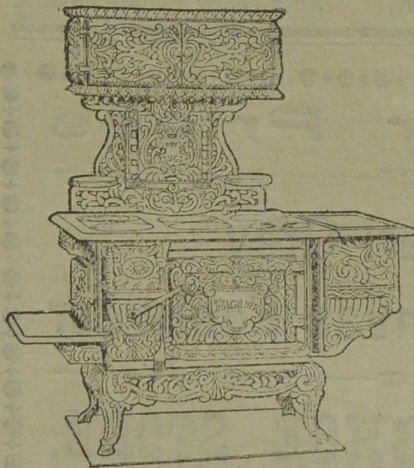
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
