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COLLINGWOOD MOURNS.

Four Prominent Young Men Lost in the Bay.

THEIR BOAT FOUND BOTTOM SIDE UP--NO TRACE OF THE OCCUPANTS.

Collingwood, Ont., June 13.—Four of Collingwood's brightest young men, Harvey Stephens, son of C. C. Stephens, Secretary-Treasurer of the Northern Navigation Company; Harry Andrews, son of Mr. S. D. Andrews of the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company; Edmond Carroll, teller of the Bank of Toronto, son of Rev. J. Carroll of Bowmanville, and Gerald Mussen, son of rector of All Saints' Church, have gone down to death in the dark, cold waters of the Georgian Bay.

On Saturday afternoon the four left this harbor in a new 16-foot dinghy, recently built by Messrs. Watt & Son for Harvey Stephens and Harry Andrews with the intention of going to the Nottawasaga River to spend the afternoon and Sunday. At the river there is a summer resort, which is quite popular, many summer cottages having been erected by people of Collingwood, Stayner and other towns.

When the party left the harbor there was scarcely a ripple on the water and for some hours they practically drifted in an easterly direction. When between two and three miles from the town they were sighted and spoken to by a young fisherman named Percy Tavers, who was returning home from the fishing grounds at the eastern end of the Georgian Bay. A short time after they were noticed from the shore by Mr. Walter Fisher of Alliston. This was the last time they were seen. Their parents and friends and no reason to become uneasy as there was little or no wind, with the exception of a short squall shortly after 9 o'clock, which to the ordinary person passed over the town and bay without attracting any special interest. Nothing was further known of the boys' whereabouts or what had befallen them until the return on Sunday evening about 8:30 o'clock of a fisherman named Robert Bishop, who came across their boat while coming home from lifting nets, which he had placed in the bay some miles further east.

He found their boat dismantled, the one mast with which it was fitted floating at its side, having been torn from its place, and one of the wire stays which supported the mast snapped in twain. The boat was full of water, and contained, besides a portion of the lunch laid in before leaving, two coats belonging to the young men. Bishop, who was accompanied by another fisherman, left his own boat, and after bailing out the wrecked craft, rowed it to the harbor.

Chief Wilde was immediately communicated with, and as soon as possible the parents and friends of the boys were informed of their suspected fate.

The news spread about the town with lightning rapidity, and within an hour it was the sole topic of conversation. People who only heard an inkling of the accident left their homes and came down town to ascertain, so far as possible, the facts surrounding the disappearance of the boys. Although the hour was late, searching parties were at once instituted, many volunteering their services, and during the long night the anxious friends awaited the return of those who drove to the Nottawasaga river, only to learn that the boys had never reached their destination. In the early hours of this morning men walked along the shore from the eastern side of the town to the river, but found no trace whatever of the missing party.

Between 6 and 7 o'clock this morning the tag Saucy Jim, with an outfit of grappling irons, and taking four small boats, also left for the scene of the accident. Several, including Mr. S. D. Andrews and Captain W. A. Clark, who have had long years' experience on the waters of the great lakes, and who have assisted in similar searches in the past, were on board. This party worked assiduously all day, returning to port at 6 o'clock this evening. They did not succeed in getting any trace whatever of the bodies, other than the finding of two woollen sweaters, one belonging to Harry Andrews, and another to Harvey

Stephens, and a small cap. These articles were picked up between four and five miles from shore and nearly three miles from the point at which the wrecked and waterlogged boat was picked up by Bishop.

When seen to-night Captain Scott stated to your correspondent that the search would probably be continued for some days, but he considered that it would prove futile owing to the depth of water and the uncertainty of the whereabouts of the accident.

CHURCH UNION.

Rev. Dr. Carman Ex- presses His Views.

HE FORESEES A STRONG AGGRESSIVE BODY.

There is no Difficulty on Essentials

BUT NO ABANDONMENT OF PRIN- CIPLES MUST BE ASKED.

Speaking on church union at the Toronto conference, Rev. Dr. Carman, superintendent of the Methodist church in Canada, said:

"It is a pleasing feature of the movement, and an evidence of the divinity of its origin, that Christian brethren around us are bidding us God-speed; are saying we are doing the right thing in restoring the breaches. You have all seen that a representative committee has been appointed by our brethren of the Presbyterian church. In the language of the street, they mean business; they mean to give this thing an honest test. I congratulate them, and I think it is our solemn obligation to meet them in the same spirit. It will devolve on us to put our committee on a better footing."

"It is no trifling question" Dr. Carman went on to say; no matter to be jumped at in a moment. It will require the deepest thought, and I propose to meet the brethren of the other churches eye to eye. We are proposing an honorable and an honest understanding and if we are all able to make the proper concessions and sacrifices, we can accomplish a brotherly and effectual union. I want no union unless the record is on high and sealed of the Holy Ghost. I want no union unless it has the approbation of the evangelic, earnest, aggressive, missionary Christian Church throughout the world. I do not want to cut all former ties, historical and Christian. It is not required of us, and we shall not require it of the honorable body of Presbyterians. They have an honorable past, whose glory they should maintain. I am sure our Methodism will never advocate plucking one laurel from the crown. Our Methodism has stood for principles. They would be unworthy of union, and we, if we or they asked abandoning of principles."

Dr. Carman ran over a few of the basic Christian doctrines, and said: "If we can find and unite on common ground, going forth with such doctrines, universally acknowledged, I tell you there will be a church of the solidest foundations and the highest evangelism the world has ever seen. It will not be creedless or invertebrate as to polity, as Principal Caven fears."

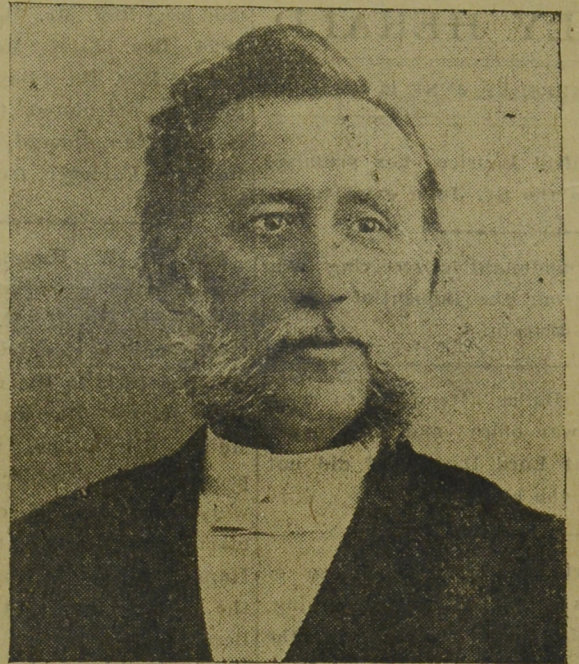

REV. DR. ROGERS.

Pastor of the Fredericton Methodist Church, Where the Conference of N. B. and P. E. I. is Now in Session.

Among the clergy of Fredericton, none stand higher in the public esteem than Rev. Jabez A. Rogers, D. D., pastor of the Methodist church.

Dr. Rogers is a native of St. John's, Newfoundland, and is 61 years old. He was educated at the Wesleyan Academy, St. John's, the Harbor Grace Grammar School, and at the age of sixteen became a full member of the Methodist church. He preached his first sermon when 17 years old, was appointed a local preacher and entered his theological studies. At 20 years of age he was recommended to the conference and received on probation the first step Rogers' first charge was at Catalina, Trinity Bay, Newfoundland, in 1862, and in 1866 he was received into full standing as a clergyman by the Conference of Eastern British North America, then comprising the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland, and was ordained at Centenary church, St. John. His first appointment was at Charlottetown as assistant to the late Rev. Dr. Richey, and his first independent pastoral charge was at Dartmouth, N. S., in 1867. Since then Dr. Rogers has held appointments in all the leading churches of the Maritime Provinces, in 1884 was president of the Nova

Scotia Conference, on four different occasions was a delegate to the General Conference and in 1885 was a member of the union committee which met at Toronto and brought about a confederation of the different branches of the Methodist churches in Canada.

Besides being an effective preacher and an energetic pastor, Dr. Rogers has very frequently occupied the lecture platform with addresses on popular subjects.

In 1870 he was married to Miss Jane M. Black, daughter of Dr. Rufus Black, whose grandfather, Rev. Wm. Black was the founder of Methodism in Nova Scotia. Last month Mount Allison University, honored the Fredericton pastor with the degree of D. D. Dr. Rogers has a family of six children, three sons and three daughters. One of the former is in the service of the Royal Bank, another, A. S. Rogers is about to be ordained to the ministry at Halifax, and the third, Mr. Douglas Rogers, recently graduated at Mount Allison and is at present at home. Of the daughters two are married, Mrs. Crowell of Halifax, and Mrs. Jack, whose husband is a bank manager at Canso, N. S., and Miss Rogers resides at home with her parents.
