SMALLPOX.

A Case of the Real Thing Developed at Gibson

ARMENIAN WOMAN, A RECENT ARRIVAL, IS THE VICTIM.

The residents of St. Mary's and Gibson have another smallpox scare.

This morning Dr. Harry H. McNally was called in to see an Armenian woman named Mrs. Williams, and after examination expressed his belief that she had smallpox.

The woman has been in this country about two weeks only. She arrived at Montreal and then proceeded to Gibson where some relatives reside, members of a colony of Armenians living near the Gibson and St. Mary's school.

Dr. McNally at once notified Mr. B. H. Babbitt, chairman of the county board of health, and the Armenian colony and the entire section within the danger limit was placed under quarantine.

On inquiry Dr. McNally learned that several Armenians have left their homes within the past few days on peddling expeditions through the country. Chairman Babbitt immediately despatched officers after them to have them quarantined wherever located.

Chairman Babbitt also had the schools closed for the balance of the week, awaiting developments.

There are no Armenian children in attendance but the proximity to the schools would warrant this course.

The patient had been vaccinated, so her disease is a vereloid type, not as severe as in an unvaccinated person, but quite as contagious.

Dr. McNally has no doubt that the woman has smallpox. The case at this stage seems quite pronounced and is altogether unlike a number of cases reported to have been smallpox in this county a year or so ago.

After returning from his visit Dr. McNally went straight to a room in his barn which he has equipped for just such an emergency. Here his clothes were fumigated and himself vaccinated and subjected to a carbolic bath.

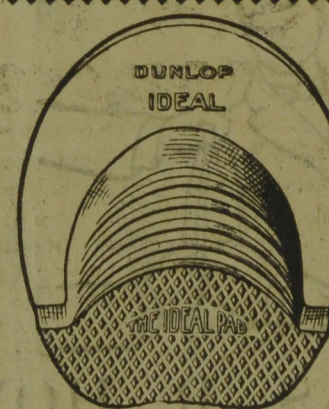
