### ACTION TAKEN.

#### Prof. Jack to Make a Report on Our Water Supply.

The water committee met last evening and held a conference with Professor E. Brydson-Jack, C. E., with a view of considering the best means for improving the Fredericton water supply. Mr. Jack has lately been making an examination of the crib well and intake, but not being an expert on sanitary engineering, he, of course, had no opinion to express to the committee in regard to any proposed changes.

The committee decided to have Mr. Jack to make a survey of the river opposite the city, test the currents, and procure all data necessary for the formation of a conclusion as to the best means of improving the water system of the city. He will commence work next week, and it is quite likely that his report will be placed in the hands of a sanitary expert for an opinion. Later on it is likely that the committee will have an analytical test made of the water at summer level.

Whether or not the council will install a filtration plant or have the intake pipe removed will depend largely on the result of the examination which Prof. Jack has undertaken.

### The Tercentenary.

St. John people have about completed arrangements for the ter-centenary celebration of Champlain's discovery of the St. John river to be held June 22, 23, 24, and 25, and the affair promises to be a great success. The programme is a most attractive one, including a public meeting with addresses by prominent local men and distinguished visitors, the presence of warships representing Great Britain, the United States and France, firemen's parade, yacht races, fireworks, an imitation of the landing of Champlain, and various other attractions. No doubt many Fredericton people will attend, and to induce visitors from this city a return railway rate of \$2.10 will be available June 22, 23 and 24, good to return up to and including June 27.

### Married an Actress.

It is announced that Mr. Guy Botwick, son of a wealthy and prominent citizen of St. John, was recently married at Chicago to an actress Miss Beatrice Gilbert of the Wizard of Oz Company. According to the story told by friends of the bride, a Chicago despatch says "the college boy became enamored of Miss Gilbert in Boston some months ago and followed the company here from New York. Monday afternoon he is said to have urged an immediate marriage so strongly that Miss Gilbert consented and they, with but two friends, proceeded to Grace church, where the ceremony was performed by Rev. Dr. Waters.

### A PROSPEROUS CONCERN.

Hartt Boot and Shoe Company Made a Good Profit Last Year.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Hartt Boot and Shoe Company, was held at the factory yesterday afternoon and was well attended. Reports submitted by the officers showed that the past year had been the most prosperous in the history of the concern. The output, which means goods of the company's own make and placed on the market, amounted to \$192,844.99, and about \$36,000 was paid in wages. The company's energetic travellers cover about all the territory between Sydney and Vancouver, and the goods are sold in every province of the Dominion. A great many orders for the fall trade have already been received and the prospect for the future is bright.

A report submitted by the auditor, Mr. F. S. Sharpe of St. John, showed that a profit equal to ten per cent. on the capital stock, was made on last year's operations of the company, which is considered a very creditable showing.

The old board of directors was re-elected as follows: John Kilburn, John Palmer, Edward Moore, J. W. McCready and John A. Read. Subsequently Mr. Kilburn was elected president, Mr. Palmer vice president and general manager, Mr. McCready secretary, and Mr. Read treasurer.
