

A RESURRECTIONIST MYSTERY.

Woman's Remains Interred in 1877 Had Been Removed from Coffin.

Springhill, N. S., March 25.—Springhill has an unsolved mystery, which doubtless will remain a mystery until the end of time. In 1877 William Hayden was one of Springhill's pioneer settlers. He built a small house at the west end of the forest town, on land owned by the late James Miller, and took for a wife a Miss Sutherland, of River Philip, a sister of Daniel A. Sutherland, now of this town. They had a family of eight or nine children, and he became comfortably well off. But on the occasion of a birth Mrs. Hayden became greatly prostrated, and at last her death was the sad result. Rev. Mr. Glass was the Presbyterian minister here at that time, and Dr. W. Cove the only physician. The church now used by the Baptist denomination was the Presbyterian church then. Mrs. Hayden was among the first to be buried in the new cemetery. Roderick McKenzie was the undertaker, and the late James Oudeab conveyed the remains to the last resting place of the dead. After his wife's decease Mr. Hayden eventually settled at Southampton, and married a Mrs. Mills. Hearing of alteration being made in the cemetery here, and new plots laid out, he came and found the spot where his first wife had been buried. He procured a new lot, and engaged some men to change the resting place of the deceased. Sinking an iron rod into the ground now partly a footpath, the outside shell in which the coffin had been lowered was found. But to his great astonishment and painful distress of mind, they found that the coffin and the body had been removed some years before. Nothing but the shell remained, half filled with fallen earth on a broken cover. Nor has a trace of it ever since been discovered. Mr. Hayden has been baffled in his big search in every direction, and the sad affair is still the unsolved mystery of Springhill. Mrs. Hayden was a tall woman of fine presence and most highly respected, but evidently the ghoul even at that early period in the town's history effectually accomplished their object.
