Public Accounts.

The public accounts committee of the legislature met this morning and continued their examination of the expenditures of great roads. In the absence of Mr. Osman on account of illness, Mr. Barnes occupied the chair. There was very little discussion over the accounts.

Valuable Estate.

The late Dr. D. H. Muir of Truro, left an estate valued at nearly \$100,000 which is divided between his two sons John R. a rancher in the North West, and David H. a medical student at McGill. There

are a few small bequests to the Episcopal church at Truro, to his sisters and servants.

County Court.

The case of John Macpherson vs Robert Gay, an action on a promissory note for \$95, is still going on before Judge Wilson at the county court. The defendant in the year 1893 had a contract to supply gravel for the city, for use on the roads and streets, and he claimed that the plaintiff, who was then a member of the city council, shared the profits with him under the terms of an agreement. He contends that the amount of the note was wiped out in that way. The plaintiff denies that there was any agreement between them as alleged. George Anderson is giving evidence for the defendant this afternoon.

Marysville Cotton Mill.

The cotton mill at Marysville started on half time this morning, which is from 9 45 a. m. to until 12 50 p. m. It is not known how long this will last but likely for several weeks. There seems to be a great deal of dissatisfaction among the employees, as several live at Gibson and Fredericton and are compelled to go to Marysville every morning and return at noon only get in three days work while they have to pay six days car fare. If the mill only runs half time they would much prefer that it be every other day.

Scott Act Case.

A contested Scott Act case against an up town druggist was up before Colonel Marsh at the police court this morning. Evidence of three witnesses were taken, but nothing of a very startling nature was brought out. One of the witnesses admitted that he had on one occasion taken a glass of ale at the establishment in question in company with a civic official. The case has been postponed until Tuesday next to give time to subpoena additional witnesses.

St. Patrick's Day Service.

A solemn High Mass in honor of the Feast of St. Patrick was celebrated at St. Dunstan's Church at 9 o'clock this morning by Rev. Father LaBlanc of French Village. Rev. Father Carney acted as deacon and Rev. Father Hannigan as sub-deacon; an appropriate and impressive sermon on Ireland's patron saint was preached by Rev. Father McRory of Boiestown. A large congregation was present.

En Route Home.

Mr. John Wandless of this city, who has been serving in South Africa for some years with the constabulary, is now on his way home. The last letter received from him was written at Capetown, and he stated that he was about to take passage for England. He also stated that times were not very brisk in South Africa at present.

Shamrocks for the M. P. P.'s

SOLD AT AUCTION.

Deaf and Dumb Property Knocked Down to J. H. Barry for \$1,405.

The deaf and dumb institute property on Forest Hill was sold at public auction at the Board of Works office this morning. The sale was well attended, among those present being noticed, Premier Tweedie, Hon. C. H. LaBillois, James Robinson, M. P., Mayor Palmer, I. W. Carpenter, M. P. P., D. J. Purdy, M. P. P., J. H. Barry, K. C., F. I. Morrison, M. Fickler, William McKay, Dr. E. W. Henry, W. J. Edgcomb, Samuel Cook, James Bird and A. E. Hanson.

The property, which consists of 112 acres, was started at the upset price of \$1000, being the valuation put upon it by Mr. A. E. Hanson, who made a survey of it for the government. The terms of the sale were 10 per cent. down, and the remainder on delivery of deed.

After a sharp competition between Messrs. J. H. Barry, K. C., A. E. Hanson and M. Fickler it was finally knocked down to Mr. Barry for \$1,405.
