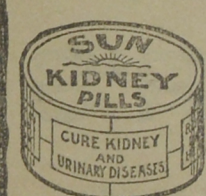
The Christmas Delineator.

BEAT MILE RECORD.

Lou Dillon Travels in 2:01 in the Face of a Cold, Raw Wind.

Memphis, Tenn., Nov. 12.—What is regarded by many horsemen here as the most wonderful mile ever trotted was accomplished yesterday by C. K. G. Billings' Lou Dillon. Forced to face a cold, raw wind that blew from the north, thus impeding the progress of the trotting queen, and her prompter as they raced down the back stretch, and under skies that were so thickly concealed by dark clouds that sight of Lou Dillon was almost lost at the far turns, she finished the circle in 2:01 without the aid of a wind shield or pacemaker in front, thereby untying the knot of 2:01½, which stood as the fastest mile of the year, and which was held as a joint world's record by Major Delmar, and Lou Dillon.

Lou Dillon was driven by Millard Sanders. The pace was furnished by Lew Banta, who drove the runner alongside of the mare from the half pole home. The fact that the trotting was rated over the first half of the journey without a running companion, and that blustery winds she was forced to face did not stop her was marveled at by many who witnessed the performance. As in her, was marveled at by many who Major Delmar's mark of 2:01½, Lou Dillon seemed to falter during the final stages of the journey yesterday.

The last quarter was the slowest fraction caught officially, while the second quarter was the fastest. The trotting queen stepped over the first quarter in 0.30. From there to the half pole she was trotting along and without protection from a mild gale blowing in her face. She passed the half in 0.59½, and then commenced to tire. The three-quarter pole was reached in 1.30, a two minute gait, but from there to the wire the little chestnut mare showed the fatigue from effects of the terrible task she had been asked in facing the wind, and struggled on home gamely in 2.01.

The official timers were E. E. Ecker New York; G. R. James, Memphis, and John E. Walker. After the trial Sanders was so pleased with the mare's work that he announced that, with Mr. Billings' permission, he will make still further effort to reduce the figure for a mile; also Cresceus's two-mile mark of 4.17.

TORTURED AGED WOMAN.

Robber Burns Soles of Her Feet, Beats Her, but Fails to Get Her Money.

Norristown, Pa. Nov. 14.—Mrs. Mary Ross, a widow, seventy years old, was aroused from sleep at 2 a. m. Sunday by a negro, who demanded money. This aged woman said she had no money. The negro asked where was the pension money she had just received. It was a fact that Mrs. Ross had received some pension money, her husband having been a soldier in the civil war, and she had hidden it away. Nevertheless, she stoutly declared that there was no money in the house.

The robber choked and beat the old woman in an effort to force her to disclose the hiding place of her little hoard, and even sawed at her hair with a big knife. Mrs. Ross remained firm, saying that he might kill her, but he would get no money.

Finally the robber lighted a candle and applied the flame to the soles of Mrs. Ross' feet. The woman screamed in agony, but although her home is well within the town no one heard her. She pleaded for mercy as her flesh was blistered and seared, all the time denying that she had any money.

Despairing of breaking her spirit, the robber bound and gagged his victim. Then he searched the small house from end to end, turning everything topsy-

turvy. He found nothing of value, and became so wild with anger at his failure that he picked up a chair and rained blow after blow upon the helpless old woman until she was unconscious.

A milkman found Mrs. Ross at 8 a. m. The police are trying to find the widow's assailant, but are hampered by lack of description, as Mrs. Ross is at the point of death, and is unable to tell much about the robber.
