Death at Durham.

The death occurred at Durham last night of Daniel Henderson, an aged and much respected resident of that place. General debility was the cause of his demise. He was seventy three years of age and leaves a sorrowing widow, three daughters and three sons to mourn their loss. The funeral takes place on Thursday morning at ten o'clock, Rev. Mr. Valentine officiating. Undertaker Robert B. Adams has charge of the arrangement.

EDWARD FRASER DEAD.

Well Known Citizen Passed Away After Lengthy Illness.

The death occurred last night at his home on King street, of Mr. Edward Fraser, a well known and respected citizen. He had not been in the enjoyment of good health for the past nine years, and for the last three weeks had been confined to his room. His condition was known to be very serious, and news of his death will not occasion much surprise among his friends. Consumption of the bowels was the cause of his demise. The deceased was a practical mechanic, and for the past seventeen years, has been employed at Mr. James S. Neill's hardware establishment. He was a man of a very quiet and inoffensive disposition, and was generally respected by those who knew him.

The late Mr. Fraser was forty-one years

of age, and leaves a widow, a daughter of Mr. Colin Campbell, and three children, the eldest, Colin, being employed at the Western Union Telegraph office. He was a native of Prince William, where his mother, five brothers and two sisters reside. They are Thomas L. Fraser, general merchant, Ex-Cong William Fraser, John Fraser, Clement Fraser and Albert Fraser, and the Misses Emma and Eliza Fraser.

The funeral will take place on Friday morning at nine o'clock with services at St. Dunstan's church by Rev. Father Carney. Interment will be made at the Hermitage.

THE BYE ELECTIONS.

Dr. Daniel's Victory Brought Joy to the Local Tory Camp.

The Dominion bye elections yesterday created considerable interest in this city, and quite a crowd assembled in the telegraph offices last evening to await results. The first St. John return gave Daniel a lead of about 75, which increased steadily until the final returns came in showing a majority of 285. This was great news for the Conservatives, who have not had much political comfort of late, and they did not fail to "rub it in" to their Liberal friends. Their only cause for regret was that they had not had the courage to accept some of the tempting bets offered on McKeown earlier in the day. A young legal light wagered \$50 that McKeown's majority would be less than 500, and is naturally very much elated over his good fortune. It is needless to say that news of Mr. McKeown's defeat was a genuine surprise to local Liberals, but the returns from Montreal and Charlottetown have quite revived their spirits. Local Conservatives were cock sure that the oft defeated Bergeron would win in St. James and the news from that constituency knocked out most of the jubilation caused by the St. John victory.
