Many of the gentlemen were in evening dress and the pretty costumes worn by the ladies contributed not a little to the attractiveness of the scene.

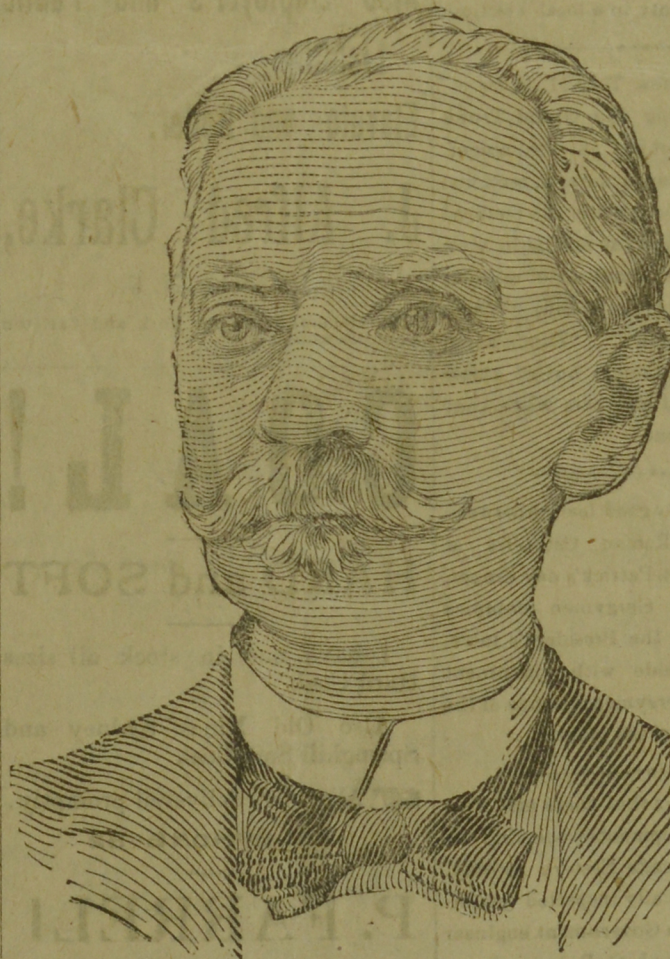

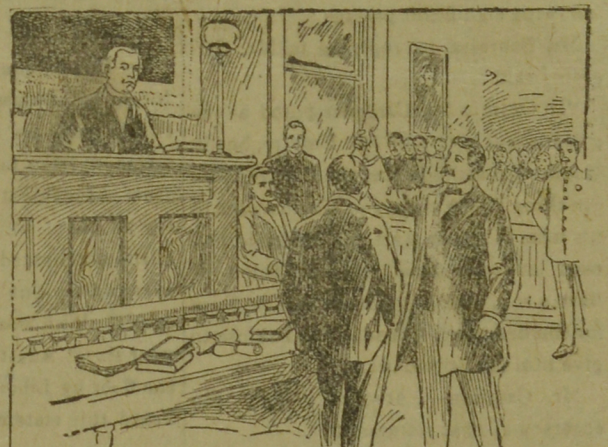
