

BIG LOG SALE.

Part of J. R. McConnell's Assets

SOLD THIS MORNING AT QUEBEC.

F. B. Edgcombe Made a Heavy Purchase.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Quebec, March 19.—The sale of assets of John R. McConnell of Marysville, N. B., by Curator Paravie, consisting of logs in Kamouraska county, took place this morning. Lot A only was sold, the purchaser being F. B. Edgcombe of Fredericton, N. B., the price being \$15,000. Lot B will be disposed of as ordered by the courts.

Lot A, bought by Mr. Edgcombe, consists of the following logs landed on the banks of Smokey river, Little Black Beaver branch and streams in Chadot townships:

Spruce, 4,126,033 feet.
Cedar, 1,140,621 feet.
Pine, 35,998 feet.
Not hauled, still in the woods near Lete, Black and Smokey rivers:
Spruce, 2,172,474 feet.
Cedar, 370,633 feet.

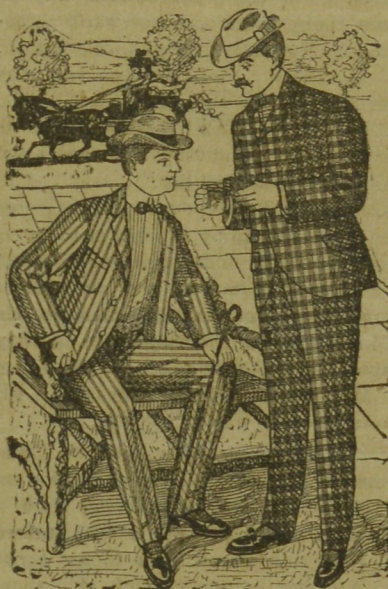
