

JAPS' GOOD WORK.

Drove Russians Out After Five Days' Severe Fighting.

VLADIVOSTOCK SQUADRON AGAIN BOBS UP.

Two More British Ships Captured in Red Sea.

AND WILL BE TAKEN TO A NEUTRAL PORT FOR EXAMINATION.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

General Kuroki's headquarter's in the field, July 23.—As a result of five days' active fighting the Japanese have secured a much better strategic point for their advance and the Russians have lost their best defensive point both on Liao Yang and Mukden Road. Four Russian guns shelled one Japanese position for an hour, this morning, without result. The Japanese guns remained silent.

Tokio, July 23, 11 a. m.—The Vladivostock squadron was seen at noon yesterday (Friday) eighty miles off Hilachi province. The squadron was going south.

London, July 23.—Count Benckendorff, the Russian ambassador, has received official notice from St. Petersburg reporting the capture of two more British ships in the Red Sea, and instructions from his government to notify Great Britain that the same procedure will be followed as in the case of the Malacca, namely, the vessels will be taken to a neutral port for examination by the consuls of the two nations concerned.

Japs Again Victorious.

Tokio, July 22, 7 p. m.—General Kuroki, after a severe fight, occupied Kiao Tung on July 19. The place had been fortified by the Russians, who defended it stoutly. In the fight General Kuroki's troops drove the Russians from their strongly fortified position on the Chi river, which is northwest of Mottan Pass, and east of An Ping, inflicting upon the enemy more serious losses than they sustained themselves. The fight began on the 18th and ended on the 14th. The Japanese lost 424 men in killed and wounded. The Russian losses are estimated at 1,000.

General Kuroki began his advance early in the morning of the 18th. At a late hour in the afternoon the Russian position was developed and the fighting continued until dark, when the Japanese forces bivouacked.

The Japanese renewed the attack at midnight, posting their artillery in the valley below and on the heights to the south of the Russian position. The main Japanese body was assigned to attack the Russian centre; a small detachment was sent toward the right flank and another to watch the enemy's left flank. After these positions had been taken, the fighting ceased for a time, but it was resumed at dawn.

Liao, Yang, Thursday, July 21.—According to private advices the Japanese are embarking two divisions near Kai Chou to reinforce their army in front of Port Arthur.

London, July 22.—A despatch to Reuters Telegram Company from St. Petersburg, says it is reported there that cruisers said to have been bought by Russia in Germany, have joined the Vladivostok squadron, which went to sea especially to meet them.

Russians Routed.

The final successful charge was delivered at 5.30 in the afternoon. The Japanese succeeded in partially cutting off the Russian retreat and this soon became a rout. The Russian forces engaged included in addition to the artillery, seven battalions of infantry and a regiment of Cossacks. The enemy left 131 dead and 300 rifles on the field. Prisoners taken estimated the Russian losses at 1,000. The Japanese lost one officer and 54 men killed and 18 officers and 351 men wounded.

On July 19, Japanese forces attacked a battalion of infantry and 1,000 cavalry, who occupied Chechiat to the northward of Shaotientzu. After four hours of fighting, the Russians retired across the Taits river. In this engagement the Japanese had 17 men wounded.

St. Petersburg, July 23, 2.05 a. m.—There is no official confirmation of General Kuroki's report that the

Japanese had captured Kiao Tung. No such place as this is laid down on the Russian maps, the nearest approach to it being Kantziatum, which is only 12 miles from Liao Yang on the Saimatzsa road. If the Japanese column which General Henschelmann was opposing on July 18 and 19 has continued to advance to this point a general engagement might have already been progressing. The general staff gives no credit to this view and is inclined to think the incident is the Russian retirement from Sikhoyan to Gontzianzi, reported in General Kuropatkin's despatch of July 19.

A despatch from General Kuropatkin to the emperor which brings events up to July 22 has been received but has not yet been given out. It is said to report only skirmishing between Lieut.-General Count Keller's army and the Japanese.

AT GRAND FALLS.

Another Successful Meeting Held by Hon. Messrs. LaBillois and Farris.

LaBillois and Farris was well attended, and the addresses of the speakers on the new Highway Act and agricultural questions were well received. J. C. A BOY AND A GUN.

Napanee, Ont., July 23.—A distressing gun accident happened yesterday on the farm of John Fields, about three miles from Napanee, the victim being Miss Pansy Warner, 14 years of age, daughter of Wellington Warner of North Fredericksburg. Frank aged 14, pointed a gun at Miss Warner, when the weapon was discharged and the charge which was of buckshot, took effect in the girl's shoulder and breast. It is not thought the injuries will prove fatal. Wilson thought the gun was not loaded.

A DRY THIEF.

CANADA AND THE U. S.

London, July 23.—The Globe, referring to Mr. Chamberlain's speech, says: "Canada is in many ways the backbone of the whole system of empire. If it stands out against the scheme, the policy of preferential tariffs will fall through. A movement is growing up in Canada favoring negotiation for a series of reciprocity treaties between Canada and the United States, which would raise an impregnable tariff barrier between Canada and Great Britain. This is what makes Mr. Chamberlain in such a hurry."

STEAMER BURNED.
