We are proud that our city government, through the influence of the chairman of the road committee, in some of the departments at least, has the credit for initiating reforms that have been quietly and calmly suggested by him previous to the general meeting and no one outside knew that he had done the work at all.

I may say that possibly, after all, the best work he has done is in creating a public sentiment that would support his colleagues in the fulfillment of duties which had not hitherto been understood or accepted as belonging to these departments of which they were the heads.

He is a power behind the mayor and don't you forget it, because he has gone thoroughly over the ground as to what has been done in the city, and that of course includes everything that is worth doing.

I believe it, and so do all the citizens, he has done wonders since he accepted office for our beautiful city, and we expect everyone to stand by him in the future.

Queens Park will no doubt blossom as the rose, as I understand he has already consulted with a party to plow and level it up and prepare the way for tree planting next spring and beautify that spot.

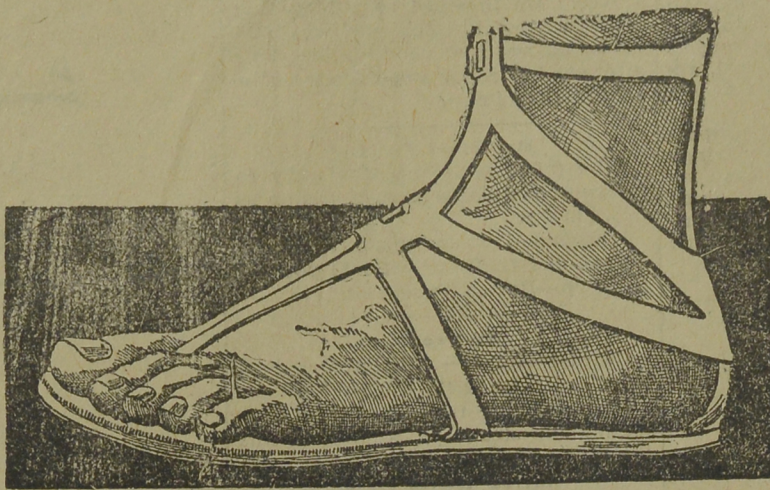

Yakutsk consists of about four hundred houses of European structure, standing apart. The intervening spaces are occupied by winter yurts or huts of the Northern nomads, with earthen roofs, doors covered with hairy hides, and windows of ice. Caravans with Chinese and European goods collect the produce of the whole line of coast on the Polar Sea between the parallels of 70 degrees and 74 degrees, from the mouth of the River Lena to the furthest point inhabited by the Chookchees. Last year a colporteur of the British and Foreign Bible Society made a tour of eleven weeks down the Lena, a river three thousand miles long, visiting Yakutsk selling Gospels in their own language to the Yakuts in the villages along the banks.

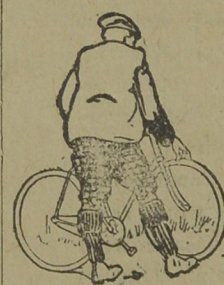
