**WILLISPEAK AT THE OPERA
HOUSE TOMORROW
EVENING.**

**Great Meeting at Hawkshaw
Addressed by Mr. Gibson
and Others.**

A grand political rally in the interests of Alex. Gibson, Jr., the Liberal candidate in York, will be held at the opera house tomorrow evening. The speakers will be Hon. H. R. Emmerson, minister of railways and canals, and Sir Frederick Borden, minister of militia and defence. As platform speakers these gentlemen are easily in the front rank and no doubt they will be greeted by a large audience. His Worship Mayor Palmer will occupy the chair. A portion of the gallery will be reserved for ladies.

The Liberal committee for the city divisions are called to meet at the committee rooms this evening at eight o'clock. It is hoped that every member will make it convenient to attend.

Hon. H. R. Emmerson, minister of railways, and Sir Frederick Borden will address a public meeting of the electors of Sanbury at the Burton court house tomorrow afternoon.

In Victoria.

Mr. A. J. Beveridge, ex-M. P. P. of Andover, is in the city today and is receiving a very hearty welcome from his numerous friends. Discussing the political situation with the Herald in Victoria and Madawaska, he said that Hon. Mr. Costigan was stronger than ever before. The Tories were making strong efforts to find a man to lead the forelorn hope against him, but have not been successful. "Nobody seems to want the job," added Mr. Beveridge, "and I do not believe that Mr. Costigan will be opposed." Mr. Beveridge's views are shared by Sheriff Tibbits, who was among the visitors to the city yesterday.

Mr. Carvell's Campaign.

A gentleman from Woodstock, who was in the city yesterday, spoke very encouraging of the political outlook in Carleton from the Liberal standpoint. He says that Mr. Carvell is putting up a vigorous campaign and is rallying to his support many former Conservatives. Mr. Hale's long absence from the county has greatly weakened him with the electors, and he finds the tide running strongly against him. The gentleman is confident that Mr. Carvell will be returned.

Reports from reliable sources in Northumberland are to the effect that Mr. W. S. Loggie's candidature is meeting with great favor among the people, and that his chances of winning the seat are considered excellent. The St. John Sun's frantic efforts to induce him to retire are being laughed at by Northumberland Liberals, including Mr. Loggie himself.

At Hawkshaw.

A rousing political meeting in the interests of the Liberal candidate was held in the public hall at Hawkshaw, last evening. The hall was filled to overflowing and the greatest enthusiasm prevailed.

George F. Burden M. P. P. occupied the chair and the speakers were Mr. Gibson the Liberal candidate, George W. Allen M. P. P. and Mr. N. W. Brown. Mr. Gibson who was given a most cordial reception, gave a brief account of his services. Touching upon the Grand Trunk Pacific scheme, he announced himself in favor of the St. John valley route, and promised to do his utmost to provide that section of the country with railway facilities.

Mr. Allen, who was in splendid form, delivered what is generally admitted to have been the finest campaign speech ever heard in that section of the country. He ably reviewed the record of the Laurier government, and was applauded to the echo as he told of its great achievements for the good of Canada. He also went fully into the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway contract and laid bare the opposition policy of misrepresentation and humbug.

Mr. Brown, who delivered the closing

address, ably sustained his reputation as a campaign orator.

At the close of the meeting a large number of electors, including several hitherto prominent Conservatives, signed Mr. Gibson's nomination papers.

Messrs. Gibson, Allen and Brown will address the electors of Bear Island to night.

THE MURDER TRIAL.

**True Bill Found Against Both the
Cammacks.**

Woodstock, Ont., Oct. 19.—There is so far nothing like the interest in the Cammack murder trial that was manifested in the celebrated Gee case, perhaps because of the election excitement.

Judge Gregory charged the grand jury at some length on the case, summing up the points of the evidence and going over the facts as set forth in the depositions taken before the magistrate. He spoke of the ridiculous idea which the Cammacks and Alice Boyd seemed to have that because her first husband was in the penitentiary she was no longer bound by the marriage tie. So far the evidence did not show any strong motive on the part of Thos. Cammack. He summarized the evidence as it stood against Walter Cammack, and told the jury that if they chose they could find a true bill in the one case, while finding no bill in the other. At the same time the depositions contained sufficient evidence to put Walter Cammack on his trial.

True bills were found in both cases.

The two prisoners accused of the murder of William Doherty stood up in the dock, and pleaded "Not guilty." They look considerably alike, the son being a larger and of course a good deal younger edition of the father. They are both of a sandy complexion and wear moustaches.

There was not a great deal of time lost in empanelling a jury. Objections were taken to three jurors, and one asked to be excused by reasons of suffering from a bad cold and being deaf. Those empanelled are Judson Biggs, Henry Montgomery, E. V. Etabrooks, Thomas T. Stewart, Mered Brewer, Jos. Yorke, Wm. Hayden, Harvey Biggar, Joseph Robinson, Jeremiah Bragdon, Horatio London and C. J. Connolly. As it was well on in the afternoon the attorney general suggested that the court adjourn until the morning so that the jurors could make arrangements necessary for their absence from their homes during the trial, and also that he might have an opportunity to examine the crown witnesses. The court then adjourned.

A BEAR STORY.

**John Gilmour of Stanley Has an Exciting
Experience.**
