C. P. R. Co. Enforcing Law Against Train Hands

FOR IMBIBING WHILE ON DUTY.

Engineers Sentenced to Prison.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Montreal, Jan. 7.—The Canadian Pacific Railway Company is determined to stop drunkenness on the part of their employees.

John Dandridge, of Three Rivers, an engineer, has been sentenced to six months imprisonment without the option of a fine, for being under the influence of liquor, while in charge of a passenger train, and Harry Hillman, of Indian Head, to four months, for a similar offence.

These are the most severe sentences ever imposed in Canada for drunkenness.

THE WOMAN IN IT.

Flora Azaeu Gives Evidence in the Cashel Escape Case.

Calgary, N. W. T. Jan. 7.—John Cashel has been committed for trial on the charge of having assisted his brother, Ernest Cashel, to escape from the police barracks.

Flora B. Azaeu, the woman in the case, in continuing her evidence, said she went to Medicine Hat previous to the escape, and that John Cashel wrote to her mentioning his plans, but ordered her to burn the letters, which she did. She said that she had been placed under arrest at Medicine Hat, and the constables had told her she would be detained until she told what she knew. She was detained five hours before she said anything.

REACHED A GREAT AGE.

Death of a Toronto ex-Postmaster Connecting Link with the Past.

Toronto, Jan. 7.—Joseph Leslie, ex-postmaster of Toronto, died yesterday, aged 90.

Mr. Leslie, who was a Baldwin reformer, was appointed postmaster of Toronto by his political friends about 1850, and remained in that position until 1879, when he was superannuated by the government of the late Sir John A. Macdonald. Mr. Leslie leaves one son, J. W. Leslie of this city, and three daughters.

THE DRINK CURSE.

Responsible for a Sudden Death at Winnipeg.

No More Humbugging.

The management of the Arctic rink state that in future there will be no long waits for hockey games to commence. MUNICIPAL TANGLE.

Warden Wilnot Resigns His Seat in the Sunbury County Council.

Quite a breeze was created at the meeting of the Sunbury County Council yesterday by the unexpected resignation of Mr. Henry Wilnot, one of the councillors for Lincoln, who had been elected warden on the previous day. The reason given for his taking the course is that he learned since the council convened on Tuesday that he had no legal right to a seat at the board.

After the warden had vacated the chair, Coun. T. P. Taylor, of Sheffield, was elected chairman pro tem, and an effort was made to unravel the tangle in which the councillors found themselves. It is thought that the first day's proceedings are illegal and will have to be done over again.

Mr. Wilnot was elected by acclamation in October last for the parish of Lincoln, along with his colleague, Coun. Abner Smith. It seems that the law requires that candidates must file their nomination papers with the parish clerk before six o'clock on the evening of nomination day, and Mr. Smith was the only one who complied with the law in this respect. A Mr. Hayward filed papers as a candidate at ten o'clock the same evening, and Mr. Wilnot, so the story goes, filed his on the following morning. Mr. Duncan Grass, was the returning officer, and disposed of the difficulty in which he found himself by throwing out Mr. Hayward's papers and declaring the old councillors, Messrs. Wilnot and Smith, duly elected.

A majority of the councillors are Conservatives, and look to Coun. George Perley, of Maugeville, as their guiding star on matters of law and parliamentary procedure. Coun. Perley's opinion on the present crisis has not yet been given to the public.

MURDEROUS HIGHWAYMAN.
