center of this deceitful industry, says
the Nation. There has been discovered
in the suburbs a thriving factory for

Egypt and in due time return as prop-
erly antiquated discoveries.

A funny story is now current about a
collector of medieval things. A cer-
tain clever workman in stone made to
the order of a dealer in medieval an-
tiquities a Venetian chimneypiece of
the fifteenth century and received for
his work some two or three thousand
francs. The dealer shipped the chim-
neypiece to Italy and had it set up in a
