A CAPABLE MINISTER.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson has been in office only six months, but in that short time he has grasped a knowledge of the business of the railway department to a remarkable degree, and when his estimates were under fire in parliament, was able to give full and satisfactory information in even matters of detail.

A great effort has been made by the Tories to discredit Mr. Emmerson, to represent him as a political nonentity, incapable of administering so important a portfolio as that of railways and canals, but the new minister has exhibited a capacity in office that delights his friends and confounds his opponents. Those who knew Mr. Emmerson intimately and were conversant with the excellent manner in which he filled important positions in the government of this province, awaited with confidence the record he would make as an administrator at Ottawa, and they are not disappointed with the result. His energy, industry, intelligence and sturdy character have served him well in his new position, and his career so far in the railway department is evidence that the important interests confided to his care are in safe hands.

A NERVY CLAIM.

Tory speakers in parliament are putting forward the claim that in appointments to the Intercolonial railway, the government should know no politics; that Conservatives should stand the same chance for preferment as Liberals.

This is a doctrine adopted by the Tory party since they were relieved of power; they never practised it when they had the opportunity. A Liberal had about as much chance of securing employment on the Intercolonial during the Tory regime, as the St. John river has of reversing its course. The Tory cry was "to the victors belong the spoils," and the railway service became the hotbed of Tory partizanship. Liberals who happened to secure appointments when the MacKenzie government was in power were kept down, and the Herald recalls one instance of a good Liberal, a well educated, reputable man who was kept in the position of conductor, until the Tory defeat in 1896 when the wrong done him was righted by the Liberal government and he was considered capable of filling the responsible position of divisional superintendent, an office he holds today with credit to himself and the railway.

When there are positions open on the Intercolonial, the government will be justified in filling them with their own friends if capable, and in that practice will only be following the Tory precedent.

INFERIOR SERVICE.

The prospects for a large tourist travel to New Brunswick this summer, are said to be very promising, and no doubt large numbers of visitors will desire to come up the St. John river. It is unfortunate that the steamboat service on the St. John is of inferior character. The boat secured to take the place of the David Weston, is not fit for the business required of her, and already

complaints on that head have been made to the Herald by strangers who expected better accommodation. There should be some means of compelling the company to put a better boat on the route.

The Foresters who have returned from the meeting of the New Brunswick High Court at Edmundston, speak in enthusiastic terms of the success of the gathering, and especially of the splendid public meeting at which the speakers included the eloquent Hon. Dr. Montague, who was minister of agriculture in the Conservative government and Judge Choquette of Quebec. The order is in a very flourishing condition in this province.

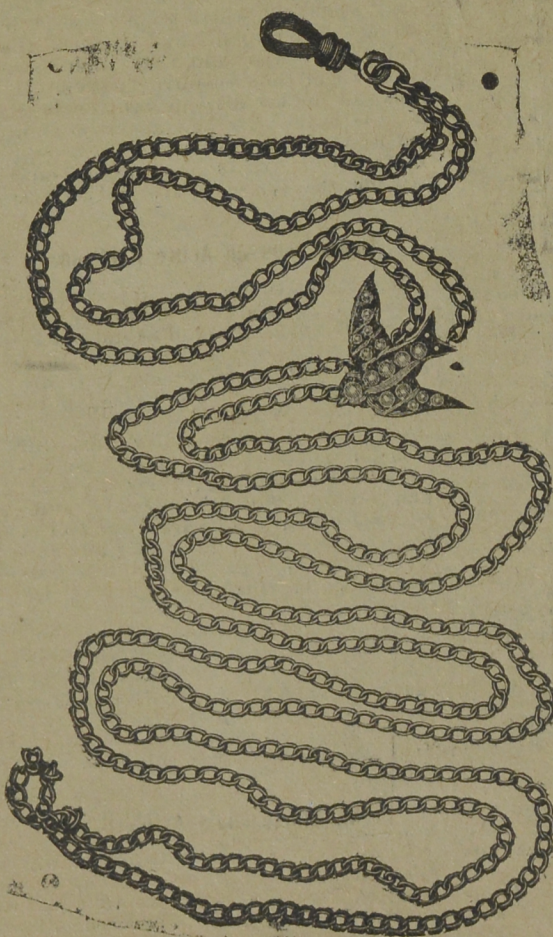
