Synod Closed its Session with Votes of Thanks.

FURTHER COMMITTEES NAMED.

Mr. W. E. Smith Re-elected Treasurer.

At the meeting of the executive committee of the Synod held previous to the regular session this morning, the following committees were appointed:

At eleven o'clock the regular business of the Synod was resumed.

Judge Hanington moved that Very Rev. Dean Partridge and A. C. Fairweather be continued as members of the Board of Governors of King's College. Carried.

Judge Hanington was elected as a trustee of the Edgehill School for Girls at Windsor, N. S.

The committee on printing of Constitution of Canons were re-elected the same as last year, except that Dr. J. H. Scammell was elected in place of Mr. C. E. A. Simonds.

The committee on Theological Study was appointed as follows: The Bishop, Rev. Dean Partridge, Archdeacon Neales and Rev. J. DeSoyres.

The salary of the treasurer was fixed at \$600, and Mr. W. E. Smith was re-elected secretary.

The Synod, by a standing vote, expressed their appreciation of the work done by the secretary and he was reappointed at the same salary as last year, \$250 and expenses.

The sum of \$10 was voted to the sexton Mr. Smuin, and the page was granted \$5 for his services.

Thanks were given to the members of the press for their efficient reports of the Synod proceedings, also to the citizens of Fredericton for their kindness, to the trustees of the Church Hall for the use of the building, to the various railway and steamboat companies who allowed the members to travel at reduced rates, and to Rev. T. W. Street for his special sermon.

Judge Hanington in an appropriate speech moved a vote of thanks to His Lordship for his presiding at the meetings of the Synod, and expressed his satisfaction that Bishop Kingdon had recovered from his recent illness. Carried unanimously.

His Lordship in reply expressed his thanks and hoped he would be able in a short time to take up his full duties as Bishop.

This concluded the business of the session.

The next meeting of the Synod will be held at St. John next year.

REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

No Vote on Nominations till Tonight or Tomorrow—Bryan Scores.

St. Louis, July 8.—When the National Democratic Convention re-assembled for the third day's session today, it was hoped by the leaders that the work might be concluded, and a sine die adjournment take place.

There yet remained to be accomplished the adoption of a platform and the nomination of candidates for the presidency and vice president.

The committee on resolutions was in session till 4.40 this morning, working upon the draft of a platform and a number of conferences

were held to consider the question of candidate for second place on the ticket.

W. J. Bryan scored another victory, the committee having voted the gold standard plank out of the democratic platform. He made two successful efforts during the evening and secured a modification of the tariff plank, on two separate votes.

When the session was called to order the committee on resolutions advised the convention of their inability to report for some time.

This would indicate that a vote on the nominations would be deferred until this evening, or possibly tomorrow.

QUIET AT SYDNEY.

Militia May be Replaced by Regulars from Quebec.

Sydney, N. S., July 8.—Today is one of the quietest days since the commencement of the great steel strike, the police and military authorities having little or nothing to do, and strikers remaining practically indoors or away from the plant.

The suggestion has been made by Col. Irving that the Halifax militia on duty at the plant be replaced by Canadian regulars now at Quebec.

This recommendation is based on the fact that many of the volunteers are employees in the city, and their firms are anxious for their return to work.

TWO MEN DROWNED.

One of Them a Divinity Student, Son of a Well Known St. John Citizen.

St. John, July 8.—James Malcolm and George Usher, of Grand Bay this morning were drowned while bathing at Grand Bay, nine miles from this city.

Malcolm was a Divinity student at Halifax, and was to enter the Presbyterian ministry. He was laboring during the holidays at Grand Bay and vicinity. He was a son of Andrew Malcolm, fish and provision merchant of St. John, and well known in curling circles.

It is believed that Malcolm perished in attempting to save the life of his companion. Both bodies were recovered.

STEAMSHIP MISHAP.

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NAVAL BATTLE

In Which Russians Are Said to Have Won.

GENERAL KUROKIS' ARMY ADVANCING ALL ALONG THE LINE.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. Petersburg, July 8.—Special despatches from New Chwang, dated yesterday say that General Kuroki is advancing all along the line, and adds that Japanese officers are organizing Chinese bandit bands throughout the Liao Valley for an attack on Mukden.

Liao Yang, July 8.—In the recent night attack on Hoi Yin Japanese lost 200 killed and 500 wounded.

St. Petersburg, July 8.—It is reported in a special despatch from Liao Yang under yesterday's date, that a persistent rumor is current there to the effect that a naval engagement occurred at Port Arthur, in which twenty-one Japanese warships participated, resulting in a Russian victory.

A similar report was current at Liao Yang, July 5, the location of the engagement then being given as northward of Gensan, Korea.

Ta Tche Kiao, Wednesday, July 6. (delayed in transmission)...The Japanese swarmed over the mountain crests early this morning and advanced on Kai Chou, compelling General Chirikoff with the centre of the Russian vanguard to fall back. A whole brigade of Japanese, with masses of cavalry, followed and occupied the village of Nan Tay driving out two companies of Russian infantry and two companies of Cosacks who were entrenched there. The Japanese arrived within five miles of Kai Chou. It was then nightfall. General Samsanoff made a heroic attempt to check the Japanese, galloping out with guns to shell the Japanese left and inflicting great loss on them. But fearing his retreat would be cut off, he fell back and is now holding Kai Chou. General Chirikoff's force is stationed south-east of Kai Chou.
