Death at Marysville.

Mrs. Rondo Clarke, widow of the late Albert Clarke, died at the home of her daughter at Marysville yesterday after a brief illness. She had reached the advanced age of eighty-eight years and leaves a family of one daughter and four sons. The children are Mrs. Dudley Babar of Marysville, Moses Clark of Gibson, Albert, of Pennsylvania, Horatio of Wisconsin, and John of Nelson, Northumberland county. The funeral will take place tomorrow at three o'clock with Undertaker John G. Adams in charge of the arrangements.

A VERY CLOSE CALL.

Mr. James M. Scott Struck by a Train at Magaguadavic Siding.

Mr. James M. Scott, vice president of the Scott Lumber Company, was struck by the locomotive of the C. P. R. express at Magaguadavic siding on Thursday morning and narrowly escaped losing his life. He was picked up in an unconscious condition, nearly twenty feet from where the accident occurred, and taken to McAdam Junction, where the services of Dr. Ryan were procured. He did not regain consciousness until nearly four hours after the accident. He was found to be badly cut about the head and face, and was also injured in the back, but fortunately no bones were broken.

It appears that Mr. Scott saw the approaching train, and crossed the track in front of it, believing he had ample time to avoid danger. The space between the edge of the platform and the rails is so narrow, that he did not care to take the risk of remaining there to allow the train to pass, so undertook to run to the end of the platform, a distance of a foot or twenty feet. He miscalculated the distance he had to go, and before he could reach a place of safety the engine caught him in the small of the back and hurled him to the ground. Fortunately he fell of the rails and lay perfectly still, otherwise he would have been instantly crushed to death by the train. His escape under the circumstances was little short of miraculous.

Mr. Scott has so far recovered from the effects of the accident, as to be able to drive from his home to the city today. He is somewhat cut about the head and is feeling a trifle sore, but expects to be himself again in a short time. He attaches no blame whatever to the C. P. R. authorities for the accident, and is very grateful for the kindness extended to him by the train hands.

AGED LADY'S DEATH.

Mrs. Christopher Milner Passed Away at Elmcroft Sunday Afternoon.

Mrs. Elizabeth Milner, widow of the late Mr. Christopher Milner, Q. C. of Sackville, died at Elmcroft the residence of her daughter, at five o'clock yesterday afternoon. Although she has not enjoyed her usual good health for several weeks, her death was a great surprise to her family and friends. Of late she has been suffering from an attack of la grippe, but seemed to be on the road to recovery and no serious results were anticipated. Yesterday morning she had a relapse, and sank quite rapidly until her death, which occurred at five o'clock. Mrs. Milner's maiden name was Morse and she was a native of River Philip, Cumberland Co., N. S. For many years she was a resident of Sackville, where her husband carried on an extensive law practice and was widely known. For the past four years she has made her home in the city. She was a most estimable lady and had hosts of friends and acquaintances in different parts of the province, who will deeply regret to learn of her demise.

The deceased lady was eighty-six years of age and is survived by one son, Mr. William C. Milner of Sackville, and three daughters Mrs. H. G. C. Ketchum of this city, Mrs. I. W. Binney of Moncton, and Mrs. George E. Stopford of Tidnish, N. S. One sister resides in Boston and another in Salt Lake city.

THE RIVER.

Recent Rain Storm Caused a Big Rise of Water.

The heavy rain storm of Saturday night has made a marked change in the condition of the river, and it looks as if the ice would go out before the end of another week. The water has risen three feet since Saturday night and is still coming up at the same rate. The ice is looking rather sickly in places, although there is no doubt that on the whole it is still pretty strong, and capable of making a lot of trouble. There is now open water along both shores and all traffic on the ice has been suspended. The small tributaries of the river are full of ice, and the rains have swollen them to fretful height. Old rivermen say that unless the weather turns cold the ice cannot last more than another week.

Hiring Their Crews.

A number of lumber operators are now in the city engaging men for stream driving. The demand is quite brisk and the wages range from \$1.75 to \$2.50 per day. It is likely that a number of men will be sent to the headwaters next week to be in readiness for work when the ice breaks up.
