Dr. M. S. Macdonald Has Been Selected

TO FILL THE VACANT CHAIR OF PHILOSOPHY AND ECONOMICS.

A Native of Nova Scotia and a Graduate of Dalhousie.

It is announced today that Dr. Mardock Stuart MacDonald of Cornell University, has been appointed to the chair of economics and philosophy at the U. N. B., vacated by the resignation of Dr. Davidson, and has wired his acceptance. The appointment is an excellent one and is bound to give satisfaction to the numerous friends of the University at home and abroad.

The new professor is a native of Whycomagh, N. S., and is about twenty-six years of age and unmarried. He was educated in the schools of his native province, and after teaching school successfully for three years, entered Dalhousie University, from which he graduated with the degree of B. A. in 1900, taking high honors in philosophy. In the following year he took his degree of M. A. He was elected to a scholarship, worth \$300 per year for two years in the Sage school of philosophy at Cornell in 1901, and in 1902 obtained a fellowship worth \$500. A short time ago he received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy at Cornell. Dr. MacDonald has had a remarkably successful career as a student and teacher and has contributed a number of articles to the Philosophical Review. He comes to the University exceedingly well qualified to discharge the important duties as lecturer in philosophy and economic subjects.

Dr. MacDonald's testimonials are excellent, and speak highly of his character and ability. Among others he submitted one from Dr. Creighton, head of the Sage school of Philosophy at Cornell, and editor of the Philosophical Review, who writes: "I have much pleasure in recommending very heartily to you Dr. Mardock Stuart MacDonald, who is a candidate for the chair of philosophy and economics in the University of New Brunswick. After a most distinguished career in Dalhousie University Dr. MacDonald came to Cornell University, three years ago as a graduate student of Philosophy. He was twice appointed to a graduate scholarship and during the past year has held a fellowship in Philosophy. In June of this year he received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy. Dr. MacDonald is a man of excellent scholarship and he has well maintained the reputation of the Canadian Universities during his course here. He was this year elected by his fellow students president of the Philosophical Club and by his tact and energy did much to promote the efficiency and usefulness of this organization.

As a teacher in the public schools of Nova Scotia Dr. MacDonald was most successful and I have every confidence in his ability to succeed in college work. Personally, Dr. MacDonald is in every way a man qualified for the position which he seeks. He has the address and manners of a gentleman, is a man of good character, thoroughly upright and straight forward, is sane and level headed, and is likely to understand students and to win their respect and confidence."

Dr. McGilvary of the same university says that Dr. MacDonald is a young man of more than usual ability and has shown himself a fine scholar. His personality is agreeable. "I am sure that he will win the confidence and esteem and good will of the people. In short he is a very promising young man and I heartily recommend him."

Prof. Walter C. Murray, a graduate of the U. N. B., and formerly a professor here, now of Dalhousie, who knows Dr. MacDonald writes very cordially in support of his application. He calls attention to the fact that while Dr. MacDonald's work has been largely in philosophy, he has also taken laboratory courses in psychology, and general courses in political economy. He adds that he was the only student in his year in Dalhousie to receive honors in philosophy. His course has been long and thorough and I have the greatest confidence not only in his scholarship and ability, but also in

his capacity to teach and hold young men. He was very popular with his fellow students and in a quiet way exercised great influence. He is very modest, unassuming, genial and will prove a delightful colleague and beloved by his students. His gifts are of the solid order and I am sure that as the years go by his power and popularity will increase. I can with the greatest confidence recommend him as well fitted for the duties of the chair."

AT BISLEY BUTTS.

Canadian Marksman Had Hard Luck in the MacKinnon Match.

Montreal, July 14.—A cable from Bisley says: In the MacKinnon Challenge Cup match on the first range at 800 yards the teams ranked as follows:

England, 496; Scotland, 486; Canada, 477; New Zealand, 457; Natal, 451; Wales, 448.

Two members of the Canadian team shot once each in decidedly hard luck. Capt. R. Dillon, of Whitby, in his second shot, struck the ground in front of the target and ricocheted to the mark, his shot counting nothing. Staff Sergeant Crowe, of Guelph, on the same shot, fired at the wrong target and his score was not counted.

After the first six men on each team had shot at the 900 yards' range, the team scores stood as follows:

New Zealand, 248; Natal, 248; England, 247; Scotland, 246; Wales, 245; Canada, 238.

The scores of the Canadians on this range were: Blair, 41; Capt. J. Crowe, 35; Staff Sgt. Crowe, 45; Dillon, 43; McGregor, 42; Moore, 32; Mortimer, 41; Scott, 35; Smith, 41; Tyers, 42; Westman, 34; Yonhill, 43.

Taking the first two ranges together, the teams stand as follows: England, 986; Scotland, 977; New Zealand, 954; Canada, 951; Natal, 941; Wales, 918.

Two members of the Canadian team won prizes in the sweepstakes competition. Pte. Neil Smith, of the 21st regiment, Stewart, (Ont.), captured second place at the 600 yards' range and obtained a prize of £4. His score was a possible of 35. Color-Sergeant W. H. Yonhill, of the 9th regiment, Winnipeg, secured tenth place at 200 yards' range, landing a prize of 13s.
