A Busy Place.

The Victoria Mill is running full blast day and night, and is manufacturing on an average about one hundred thousand feet for the day shift and forty thousand for the night crew. The gang and rotary saws are kept going in the day time, but at night only the rotary is used. The company is making extensive shipments of manufactured lumber to the American market.

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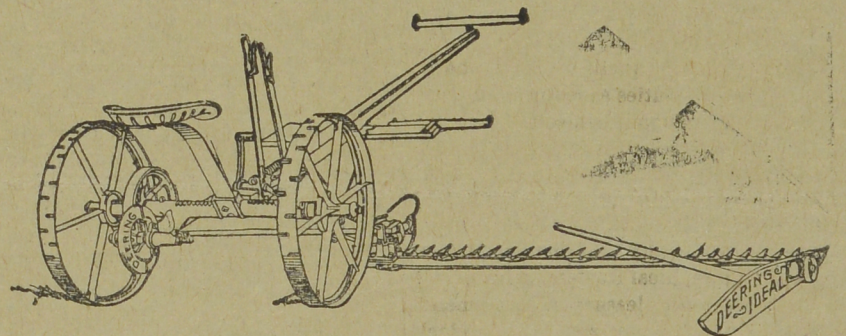

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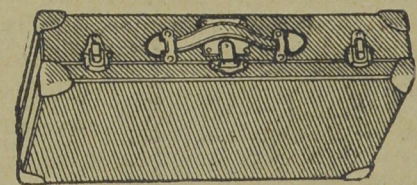
