SUNBURY AND QUEENS.

Hon. H. R. Emmerson's Powerful Speech

AT THE BURTON COURT HOUSE.

Government's Progressive Policy Ably Discussed.

A STRONG APPEAL ON BEHALF OF DR. H. B. HAY.

Certainly not since the union of the Counties of Sunbury and Queens, has such a demonstration been seen as that which took place at the Court House at Burton on Thursday, 20th October, at noon. There were gathered the people of Sunbury from every parish in the county to hear the Minister of Railways explain the policy of the Laurier government, and give an account of their stewardship during the last number of years.

Hon. Chas. Burpee, the veteran of Sunbury, and chairman of the Liberal committee of the county, occupied the chair and introduced the minister. Mr. Emmerson, who was in particularly good voice and was feeling confident of victory, not only in the Dominion, but in this province, and in these counties, held the attention of the large audience for upwards of two hours, and at the conclusion of his speech was congratulated by those present on the admirable and clear and satisfactory exposition which he delivered. He held the attention of the audience from the start to the finish, and with the exception of the interruptions caused by the applause and laughter, not a sound of interruption could be heard.

HON. CHAS. BURPEE

In introducing Hon. Mr. Emmerson, remarked that it was fifty years and some months since he first had the honour of addressing a Sunbury audience. Half a century of his life had been devoted to the interest of the Liberal party in this county of Sunbury. He wished, on this, probably the last occasion that would offer, to thank the people and to assure them he had a great sense of gratitude for their hearty support. He would not take up any more time, but would introduce Hon. H. R. Emmerson, Minister of Railways.

HON. H. R. EMMERSON

who was received with applause said: Mr. Chairman, ladies and gentlemen, electors of the united counties of Sunbury and Queens:

I quite recognize the fact that the hour selected for this meeting is a very inopportune one, one presenting great inconvenience to the people; but I am glad that so many of the representative men of this section are gathered here today. I have never had the opportunity or the pleasure of addressing a Sunbury audience, except in this Court House on one

or two occasions. I certainly never had the privilege of standing upon this platform to discuss the political issues of the day. I am exceedingly grateful to be permitted to come here today. As many of you probably well know, I was born in Sunbury. I can look across the river and see the spot; and, I am sure coming here on such an occasion, one is apt to grow reminiscent.

However, to come to the subject of the present gathering, we have here in Canada today two great parties, and I am here not to discuss a personal matter, not a matter that concerns an individual, but a matter that concerns the people. I expected, I had hoped that Sir Frederick Borden would have been able to come here, but in consequence of his having to address a meeting at Wolfville last evening, he could not come across the Bay in time to take the morning train, and so could not come here. I would have liked to have got here at an hour when the people could gather without inconvenience to themselves, but, as you know, my time is very limited. I have to attend measurely to all Canada and I have to travel all over New Brunswick, addressing meetings in the different constituencies. I did not come here with the idea I could teach you gentlemen anything; I am here simply as the representative of the Laurier government. Four years ago I was elected to the Parliament of Canada, representing the County of Westmorland; and, in the course of time, Sir Wilfrid Laurier invited me to

A POSITION IN HIS CABINET,

and placed in my hands the important Department of Railways and Canals, and, perhaps a greater responsibility—the representation of New Brunswick in his Cabinet. I took upon myself that responsibility and duty with a great deal of timidity and with some hesitancy. I recognized the fact that the gentlemen who held the same position in years gone by were men of distinguished ability, and I felt that a great deal would be expected of me, that I would have a great work to do and the responsibilities were numerous and onerous. I was conscious of my own weakness and inability, but conscious at the same time that there was no one who had ever held the position who had a stronger desire to serve the interests of the people of New Brunswick than I had. (Applause.) I determined then that I would strain every effort and put forth every energy in the interests of my native Province of New Brunswick and in the general interests of the Dominion of Canada. I need not say more. These preliminary remarks clear the way for a little discussion as to the main issues.

For a lifetime I have been a Liberal, my very earliest associations with politics were with the Liberal party, and where I stood then I stand today. I have had great pride during all these years in the record of the Liberal party.

As I see before me, presiding over this meeting, Mr. Burpee, a life-long and when I think of the men who are associated with me in the Liberal party in the Parliament of Canada, and call to mind the men who held the principles of Liberalism in days gone by,

THERE IS AN INSPIRATION TO ME as a younger man, as one who comes into the ranks later in the day, there is an inspiration to me to put forth every effort and to aid in making the record of the Liberal party equal to its record of past days. I have had a pride in the Liberal party and my associations with it, but I wish to show you why you should all take a greater pride in the record of the Liberal party during the past few years, and I want to point out to you who have been associated with the Liberal party the reasons and grounds for their faith in the party at this particular time.

We have two great parties in Canada—the Liberal party, which is led by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and the Conservative party, which is led by Mr. Borden. Each of these parties has held the reins of government, each has had a trial before the public and each has a record, and it is "By their fruits ye shall know them." Has not

the record of the last eight years been such as would stimulate Liberals to greater activity? And is it not such as would call forth the admiration of every good citizen of Canada? If not, then any attempt on my part to talk about the issues of the day from a political standpoint would be utterly futile. What is the record of the Liberal party? With respect to the men themselves—the Liberal party for eight years has governed Canada and the men composing that party have stood above reproach. There has not been

attached to the leader of that party or any of his followers. Parliament has been entirely free of charges of wrongdoing, for if anything is wrong on the part of the government or administration of any department, Parliament is the place where charges are made and that is where the evidence should be heard and where the case should be tried. Have you heard of any charges? Has the Public Accounts Committee been occupied with the investigation of scandals?

No. There has been an absolute poverty of scandal, a poverty of charges of wrongdoing, a poverty of charges of misconduct in office. Compare that with the record of the Conservative party, say in the nineties, take that decade. Members of the Cabinet were driven from public life because of wrongdoing. Men were expelled from Parliament because of wrongdoing. Members of Parliament were sent to jail because of wrongdoing. In that respect alone I am sure the contrast and comparison is altogether in favor of the Liberal party as against the Conservative party.

THE NATIONAL POLICY.

You remember in 1878, when the McKenzie government was defeated and went out of power, the new government was led by Sir John A. MacDonald, and they sent forth the word that they were going to save the country, they were going to inaugurate a policy that would redound to the honor and credit of the Dominion of Canada, and the uplifting of the Canadian people, they promulgated what is known as the National Policy. It is true I did not believe in the principles of that policy, I opposed it; but, in common with every good citizen, I hoped that the effects would be all the promoters claimed, although it did not agree with my own views. I hoped it would inure to the people of Canada continued prosperity and progress. We all agree in one thing, Liberals and Conservatives alike; regard for the welfare of our country. When the country is prosperous we are prosperous, and we realize that. The policy was launched, Parliament ratified the propositions of Sir Leonard Tilley, and we had eighteen years of the National Policy. Now I am not here to say aught against the men who inaugurated that policy. I am not here to discuss abstract propositions, I am not here to indulge in criticisms as to theories, but I am here to draw your attention to the results.

Reflect upon what occurred during the eighteen years of the National policy. Did trade expand? Did prosperity abound? I well remember and

no doubt all of you do, on the occasion of an election the orators in support of Conservative principles took the platform with arms laden with blue books and scores of documents to prove to the electors of Canada that they were prosperous, to show that the country was in a state of prosperity. Well,

IT WAS UPHILL WORK FOR THEM.

As Sir Wilfrid stated in Ontario: "My friend Foster is bringing the public documents to show you you are prosperous, when I get into power you will know of your prosperity by the jingle of the coin in your pockets." (Applause.) Prosperity is in the very atmosphere of Canada today, there are evidences of it on every side. Today the man who earns his bread by the sweat of his brow is receiving \$1.50 per day. We know that a few years ago he received but 1. The merchant, the manufacturer, the agriculturist, all alike have enjoyed prosperity during the past eight years, and we feel it—we realize it, it is admitted on all sides. Well, is the government to receive any credit for that state of affairs? Our Conservative friends say "No." It is all due to Providence, and therefore, our thanks are due to Providence and to Providence alone. It is only a matter of accident that the Liberal government were in power during these years of prosperity.

I admit we should all give thanks to the Giver of all good, for the blessings he has showered upon us; but it seems to me very strange that providence has been kind only when the Liberals have been in power. Was providence not as kind between 1878 and 1896? Did not Providence do its art during those years? The point is this—Under Conservative administration the bonds were tightened and made was shackled, but the Fielding arif loosened these bonds, cast off the shackles, and trade found its free course and the pulse throb of national life began to beat as never before. Since that time our trade has increased by leaps

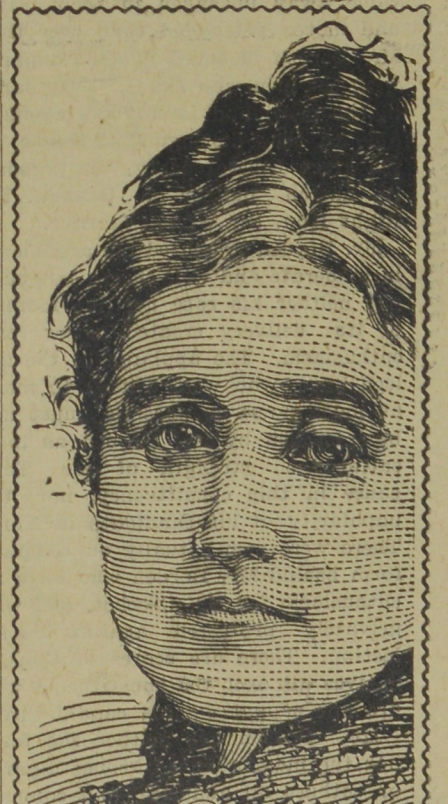
BEYOND ALL PARALLEL.

Our trade only increased on an average of \$4,800,000 a year during the Conservative rule, but in the hands of Mr. Fielding our trade has been extended at the rate of \$32,000,000 a year on an average. (Applause.) This period of eight years has been a period of surpluses; last year the surplus was upwards of \$16,000,000, the year before it amounted to about \$14,000,000, and so on back to 1897. There has been an increased expenditure in the interests
