

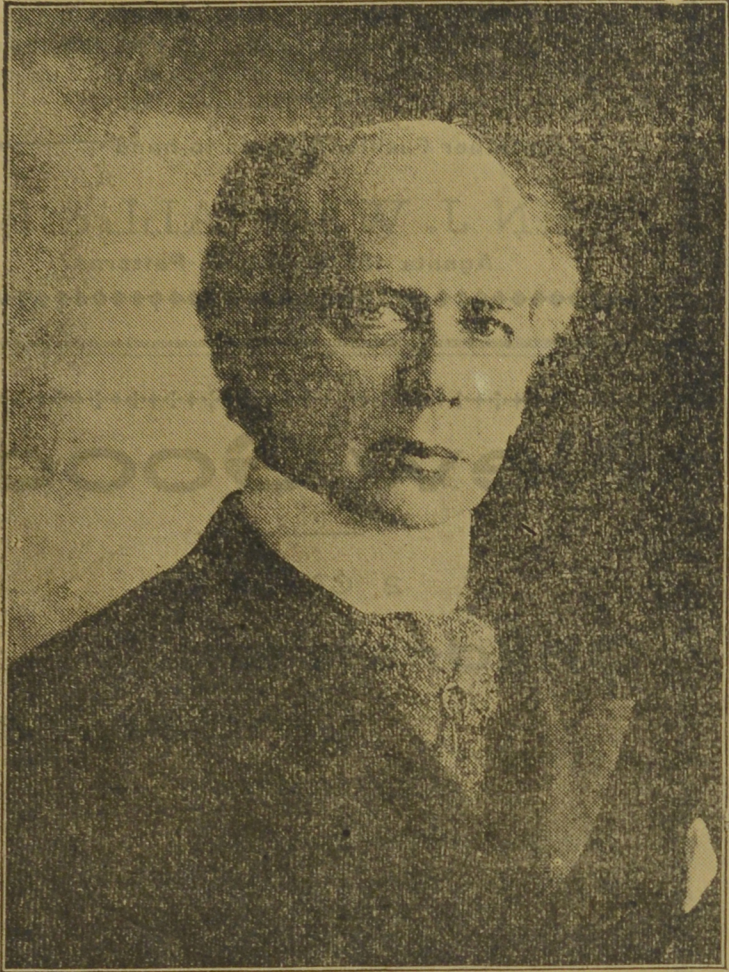

MORLEY SPOKE.

Distinguished Englishman
Made Clever Address
at Toronto.

FAVORABLE POLITICAL POSITION
OF CANADA---ALLUDED TO
IRISH QUESTION.

The following are some of the salient passages in the great speech which Rt. Hon. John Morley delivered in Toronto:

"You will understand what I am at when I say I submit to you that in my view, no policy that withdraws either your attention or diverts your resources from the gigantic and supreme beneficent task that lies around you of laying the solid foundation of prosperity in your own land—that any such diversion, and such departure, would be, I submit, a grievously mistaken policy. And, depend upon it—like my distinguished host here, I have thought of this question for many years—and depend upon it, for you here with your own work lying to your hand, to suffer yourselves to be caught in the entanglements and quarrels of the Old World, would, indeed, be a poor compensation for the loss you would suffer in attention to your own development and your own good."

"Surely I am not going too far, I am not treading on too burning ground—at any rate, you were kind enough to ask me to speak, and I tell you frankly the thoughts that came to me—if I were a Canadian I would say that the temperature and climate, the moral and political climate, of this land is the temperature and climate of peace and brotherhood."

"You have the enormous advantage here—first of all, you have the enormous duty imposed on you of performing duties away from the entanglements that, necessarily or otherwise, beset the statesmen responsible for Great Britain, and you would, indeed, be unwise if you were to let go one shred of that advantage."

THE IRISH QUESTION.

"But one of our dangers in Great Britain, and it is a most serious danger, is the weakening and discrediting of parliament by our breaking up, as most of the continental chambers have done, into groups, instead of two solid working parties confronting one another and fighting on principles."

"They would gather, proceeded the speaker, that his thoughts turned to Ireland, struck by the points of resemblance between the French-Canadians and the Irish. It was a mournful reflection to him that had the same policy been adopted for Ireland as for Canada in 1763 the history of Ireland would be vastly different. Anything that set up division between two races anywhere in the world worked mischief to mankind."

"If I had the honor of being what is called a statesman in Canada," began Mr. Morley, when such a roar of laughter broke out as fairly astonished him. He repeated his sentence amid renewed laughter:

"If I was what in Canada is called a statesman I don't believe I should find any part of my work more interesting than in making effusion and common effort for the common good of the land." He believed that after the general election in England that with the distribution of parliamentary power the Irish party would be able to hold the balance between the two parties."

All were agreed in a common desire to do justice to Ireland and the gift of £112,900,000 of good British money was proof that they were not only just but generous."

"It is should appear that these Irishmen are in a position to determine for us who our rulers are to be and what their policy shall be, I think that John Bull will waken up to consider the question is such a state of things is really terrible; and he will perhaps apply himself again to a solution of the national difficulty which is still outstanding and still confronts us."

MADE AND LOST SIX FORTUNES.

J. F. Kilgour, "Bluestone King," Dies in Insane Asylum.

Passant, N. J., Nov. 1.—John Fletcher Kilgour, of this city, died today after a lingering illness at the asylum for the insane at Morris Plains, a mental wreck due to the succession of disasters which followed his last attempt to build up a fortune after having built up and lost six. Born in Kingston, N. Y., in 1841, he began life as a teamster for his father, who was an impoverished bluestone quarryman, and five years after established himself in the business at the age of twenty-one, forging ahead of his competitors in Ulster County, N. Y. He became worth \$1,000,000.

Satisfied that bluestone was not confined to Ulster and Greene Counties, he began a prospecting tour which ended in the purchase of an extensive tract of land in Pike County, Penn., on the Delaware River. The results surpassed his expectations, and attracted the attention of James Fisk and the late Jay Gould, with whom he organized a concern which met ruin in the panic of 1873. Mr. Kilgour resumed business with a score of hands in 1887, and the Kilgour Bluestone Company was formed. This was immensely profitable. Large mills were erected at Parker's Glen, and Kilgour became the owner of Shohola Glen, Stairway, and Kilgour Station, now the property of the Erie Railroad. Reverses in later years by which he became penniless drove him insane.

He was familiarly known as the "Bluestone King." Mr. Kilgour is survived by six children.

Married on Deathbed.

New York, Nov. 2.—When the funeral of Mrs. James Henry was held from her home, at 414 West Twenty-fifth Street, yesterday afternoon, the story of her marriage on her deathbed first became known.

A week ago yesterday she was sent to Bellevue Hospital, in the last stages of consumption. From the first the doctors held out no hope for the patient, but she never agreed with them.

"I cannot die," she moaned; "there are so many things for me to do."

To the nurses she often spoke of the man she was to marry. Her devotion to him aroused all their sympathy, and nothing they could do to alleviate her suffering, physical and mental, was neglected.

To Dr. Lancaster, who had become deeply interested in her case, she said:

"I want to die Jim's wife."

On Friday afternoon Dr. Lancaster saw that the woman's condition was critical. He asked her what she wanted done.

"Send for Jim," was her only request.

Messengers hurried after Mr. Henry. He went at once to the hospital, and was taken to the bedside of the dying woman, she told him she wanted to die his wife.

Mr. Henry consented gladly. The Rev. Father Garvin of the Carmelite Church, in Twenty-eighth Street, was summoned, and hurried to the bedside. With some of the attendants for witnesses, Father Garvin pronounced the words that made the pair man and wife.

The patient smiled faintly. Fifteen minutes later she died.

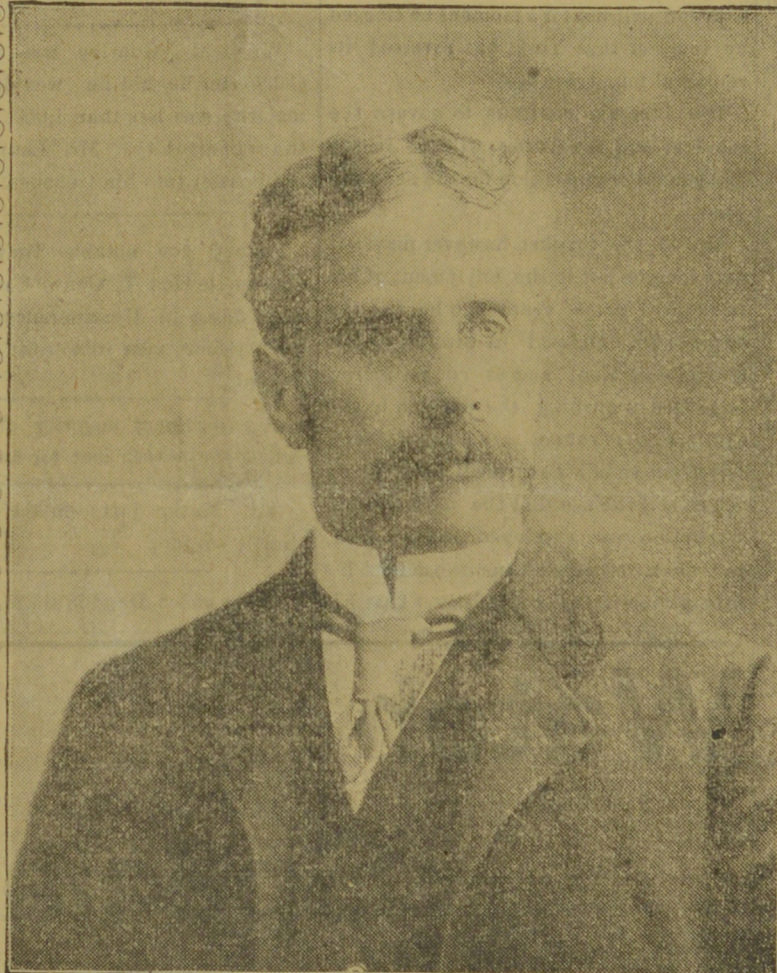

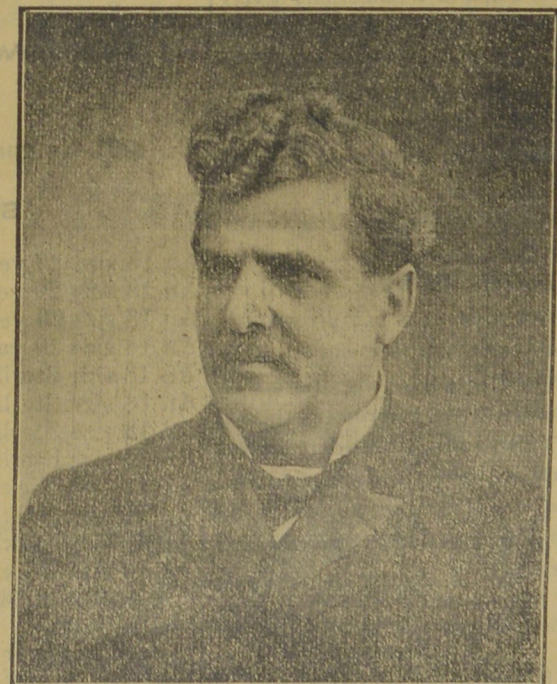
