Lord Dundonald left us three days ago and Canada still survives.

The Democrats want the solid South, New York and three other doubtful states to elect Parker to the presidency.

The Railway Commission of Canada, of which Hon. A. G. Blair is the efficient chairman, will leave Ottawa shortly for a two-months official visit to the west.

The city council meets tomorrow evening, and perhaps the aldermen may be able to report some progress in the matters which they have handed over to the care of their special commissioner. The erection of the fire alarm tower should certainly be no longer delayed.

The largest real estate transaction of the season is reported from Winnipeg. Mr. E. W. Day, of Toronto, has closed a deal by which he purchased twelve townships of C. P. R. land some forty miles east of Weta-skiwin, along the branch railway now being built. One hundred and twenty thousand acres are included in the purchase, and the transaction involves three-quarters of a million dollars.

One of the leading weeklies of New York commenting on the silly war talk of our militarists, very properly says:—"There is no more danger of war between us and Canada than there is between any two of our individual States, and to talk as if such were the case is sheer puerility, a species of idle and empty stuff that sane men would never think of uttering except for patriotic purposes before a military gathering."

Prof. John Campbell, who at the Presbyterian General Assembly meeting in St. John, a few weeks ago rather indignantly resigned his professorship in the Presbyterian College at Montreal, because Prof. Scrimger was elevated to the presidency over Campbell's head, dies suddenly Saturday at his summer cottage in Muskoka. Deceased was 64 years old, a native of Edinburgh, and a very eminent man.

The correspondence submitted to parliament relative to the Canada Eastern Railway, shows that the deputy minister of railways and the traffic manager of the I. C. R., fully appreciate the advantages of government acquisition of the road. They especially called attention to the important territory served by the Canada Eastern, and the importance of capturing its traffic for the Intercolonial.

The residents of St. John street, who are jealous of the good name of that locality, will feel grateful to Ald. Farrell and City Marshal Roberts for removing a troublesome family who occupied premises on that street between Charlotte and Union. The aid of the police department machinery was evoked for that purpose some days ago, and the offenders were ordered out of the town, but apparently no effort was made to have the order carried out, and the lawlessness continued until people interested in the matter called on the city marshal, who represented the matter to Ald. Farrell, chairman of

the Almshouse committee, with satisfactory results.

Referring in the Imperial Parliament to the Lord Dundonald incident in Canada, and his political speech at a Toronto Tory gathering at which the name of Sir Wilfrid Laurier was hissed, Mr. Winston Churchill said: "It seemed on the face of it matter for grave consideration of the House that an officer who went to Canada as the King's officer should be the principal figure at a meeting where the King's minister was the subject of a hostile demonstration. The government ought to be grateful to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. In the long course of the last eight or nine years when very difficult and delicate situations had arisen, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, by his tact, skill and loyalty, had been of incomparable value to the Empire."

A parliamentary debate which we publish from Hansard today, shows, how the opposition have wasted the time of the House, in foolish discussion. There seems to have been an organized attempt on the part of small bore Tories of parliament to worry Mr. Emmerson on the question of private cars, but the minister of railways was more than a match for the whole gang, maintaining a good temper in the face of great provocation to retaliate on his would be tormentors. Mr. Emmerson has won golden opinions this session on the excellent manner in which he has carried the business of his department through the House, commanding alike the respect and confidence of friend and foe.

The member of the House of Commons who made the observation that if some of the colonels who have seats in parliament and take up so much time talking military matters, were sent about their business, the work of the country would be proceeded with much greater despatch, is entitled to credit for the very timely remark. Canada is a long way from adopting militiaism as a leading feature of its policy, and the great majority of the people care very little whether we have a militia force or not. However it is very important to those who like fuss and feathers, and it is among this class that most of the talk is heard.

A great deal of satisfaction will be felt in Fredericton at the decision of Rev. F. Clarke Hartley, to refuse the call which he has received from Houlton, and to remain with his present congregation in this city. The Rev. gentleman besides being an effective pastor is an excellent citizen, whose removal would be much deplored, not only by his own people, but all who appreciate true worth, zeal and earnestness in the ministry.

There is a feeling both at Tokio and St. Petersburg, that the final assault on Port Arthur is probable within the next few days, and the position of the Russian forces defending the stronghold is said to be very uncomfortable. The Japs have gradually drawn a cordon around the doomed city, capturing one by one by great bravery and loss of life, the strong positions held by the defending army.
