Word comes from Connors' that the sudden rise of water in the St. John river last night resulted in a big collection of cedar logs above that point, belonging to Duncan Sinclair and others, breaking from their moorings and going adrift.

A small cedar raft broke away from the west end saw mill this morning and drifted down below the railway bridge where it was caught. Several small rafts also broke away from the booms at Douglas, but were captured before they had gone far.

The Drill Hall.

The Herald is assured by those in a position to know that the plans and specifications for rebuilding the R. C. R. drill hall in this city are complete, and work on the structure, the front of which will be built of brick, will be undertaken at once. Much credit is due to Mr. Gibson, M. P., for urging on the military authorities at Ottawa prompt attention to the work.

Great Rise of Water.

The water in the river here is now four feet higher than it was on Saturday night and a great many logs from the corporation drive are running into the booms. Between nine o'clock last night and ten this morning the river here rose exactly thirty inches by actual measurement. It

is believed now that all the logs in the main river will be got into the booms without difficulty.

Mr. J. J. McCaffery of the Queen Hotel, is arranging to open a bowling alley in the near future on the lawn in rear of his hotel. Work on the building has already commenced and Mr. McCaffery expects to have the alley in running order by October 1st.

CROWN LAND MATTERS.

Investigations Being Held by the Acting Surveyor General.

Premier Tweedie, acting surveyor general, held an investigation at the crown land office this morning, in the matter of a timber lease in the County of Gloucester, held by Messrs. Engel and Lowell of Bangor. The lease which was for 142 square miles, was taken out several years ago, but no operations had been carried on by the lessees. After hearing an explanation from Mr. W. P. Lowell, one of the lessees, the Premier decided that they could retain the lease on payment of the renewal mileage amounting to \$1,152. In addition they must pay stumpage on ten thousand superficial feet per square mile, amounting to \$1,800, payable to be made within ten days. The Premier is also investigating the matter of a mining lease at Grand Anse, near Dorchester, held by ex-Governor Ladds of Rhode Island. The investigation was commenced at the instance of Mr. David G. Taylor of New York, the owner of the land. It is claimed that the lessee has carried on no mining operations on the land, and thus should forfeit his lease. Mr. James Friel of Dorchester, and Mr. Austin Brainard, of the New York bar, are looking after Mr. Taylor's interests, and Mr. J. H. Barry, K. C., appeared for ex-Governor Ladds. A telegram from New York, announces the death of Mr. Taylor, at that place last night, and on that account it is likely that the enquiry will be postponed.

Harvest Festival.

The annual harvest festival exhibition of the Salvation Army will take place from September 17th to the 20th inclusive. Farmers will give produce from their farms, merchants will give goods from their stores, and others will give cash to assist the local corps in making this, the last effort under their present commissioner, Miss Booth (who will bid farewell in November) the best.
