RARE CAMBRIAN FOSSILS.

The World-Famous Collection of Dr. Matthew, of St. John, N.B.

The University of Toronto has again been the recipient of a generous gift. The collection of Cambrian fossils made by Dr. George F. Matthew of St. John, N.B., one of the two acknowledged experts in North America in Cambrian palaeontology, has been for sale for some months, and until now it was feared that, although it can never be duplicated, it would, like so many other Canadian objects of scientific interest, become the possession of one of the great museums of the United States or Great Britain. The sum required, several hundred dollars, was not at the disposal of the University of Toronto, nor apparently at the disposal of the National Museum at Ottawa, to which the collection would certainly be a most valuable addition. However, by the generosity of Mr. William Mackenzie, of the Toronto Street Railway, this collection has been saved to Canada, and will become the possession of the university. In addition to the cost of the collection, Mr. Mackenzie has also provided the cost of a number of cases for the fossils.

The following note on Dr. Matthew's collection by Mr. Parks of the university will be of interest:

In view of the great antiquity of the Cambrian series, well preserved organic remains are exceedingly scarce in these strata. In fact, nearly all the Cambrian fossils ever found, in any part of the world, are more or less fragmentary and imperfect. However, as the history of the chain of life, so far as it is exhibited by fossils, begins with the organisms of the Cambrian, the importance of the forms there occurring cannot be over-estimated. It is almost superfluous to say that the scarcity and fragmentary character of these fossils render their collection very difficult and their identification impossible, except to one who has made a life study of the organisms of this distant period. Such an one is Dr. George F. Matthew of St. John, N.B. Forty years ago Dr. Matthew began the study of the Cambrian rocks of New Brunswick. At that time but one or two fossils were known in these rocks; now more than 400 have been recognized, and every one of these is represented in the collection. We have then 400 different species each represented by from five to ten specimens, say 2,500 in all. The peculiar value, both academic and historical, lies, however, not in the numbers of the collection, but in the fact that they are nearly all the actual specimens first found and described by Dr. Matthew; in technical

language, the "type" specimens. These can never be duplicated, and must always remain a unique and valuable possession of the University of Toronto.

Besides containing all the type specimens, the collection shows many forms which, in addition to being type or first specimens, are absolutely the only ones ever found. This will serve to show the peculiar value of such material and to point out the extreme rarity of many of the organisms of this ancient series of rocks.

Another feature of this collection of especial value is the fact that it is complete; it contains all the known fossils from the Cambrian of eastern Canada. It is unnecessary to say that such a remark can be made of very few collections from any place or any age.

In addition to the material above described, the collection contains about as many more specimens from the Cambrian of other parts of the world, making in all about 5,000 specimens.

The Canadian Jay.

Mr. Charles Pickering of Toronto, writes: On the 15th October I saw three Canada jays (*Perisoreus Canadensis*), the Wis-Ka-Tjan of the Indian, the Whiskey Jack of the lumberman, which were killed this morning on Fisherman's Island. Though common throughout northern Ontario and northward to Arctic America, it is very rare in southern Ontario. Mellwaith in his *Birds of Ontario* gives no authentic record of its capture so far south, though he mentions hearing of one being taken at Oshawa. This bird, well known to all lumbermen and prospectors, with whom he is a star boarder, is not thought so much of by the hunter, for whom he has destroyed many a fine carcass of venison, tearing off the fat and strips of flesh, which he would store in the cleft of some nearby tree for future use. Who can tell the cause of this unusual migration? It cannot be fear of cold nor yet scarcity of food, as he is a general scavenger, as much at home in the dense pine forest as around the mining camps, picking up whatever is thrown out in the shape of food. On the 15th I saw a large flock of snowbirds, and on the 11th and 12th flocks of wild geese were seen. On the 16th three more Canada jays were seen.

Game of Newfoundland.

Newfoundland, like Ireland, is innocent of snakes or reptiles. Its hills, all in the interior, are infested with bears, mountain lions, wolves, foxes and gophers. Song birds are few, the

though there is a species of unmusical jay that may outnumber the red-breasted beauty familiar to more southerly and inland latitudes.

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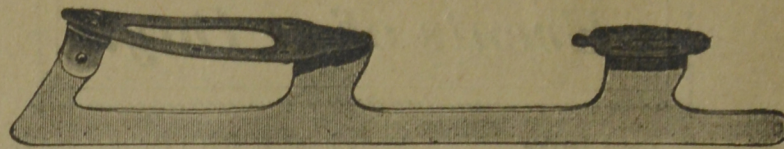
