MONTHLY RETURNS.

Imports for January Show an Increase-- The Savings Bank.

The amount deposited in the government savings bank during the month of January was \$12,824, and the withdrawals for the same period amounted to \$6,341.65. The balance due depositors Jan. 31st was \$1,005,283.39.

The value of goods entered for consumption at the port of Fredericton during the month of January was \$29,721, of which \$23,721 worth were dutiable. The duty collected amounted to \$1,283.57. For the corresponding month of last year the total value of imports was \$25,040, and the duty amounted to \$1,905.

The amount collected in fines at the police court during the month of January was \$320.

Another merchant is said to have made an offer of \$4,000 for the John H. Reid property on Queen street, but Mr. Reid declined to sell at that figure.

MUST PAY FULL FARE.

Reduced Rate Certificate for Clergymen on C. P. R. Abolished Today.

Telegraph: In future, owing to section 252 of the new railway bill, which prohibits the granting of any special privileges to any person, the C. P. R. has given notice that it will not issue to clergymen any more certificates under which reduced rates are granted. All ticket agents were instructed to honor the certificates issued in 1903 until January 31, but today all certificates will be cancelled. The rule applies on all roads in Canada except those owned by the government. The I. C. R. has issued certificates for 1904 as usual.

On the C. P. R. reduced rates will still be given commercial travellers, and for theatrical or any parties numbering ten or more the rate will be two cents a mile.
