Some Large Expenditures
Made on Account of
Smallpox.

The following report from the Board of Health was read by the secretary treasurer at the Municipal Council meeting:

St. Mary's, York Co.
Jan. 19th, 1904.

To the warden and council of the municipality of York:

Gentlemen: The local Board of Health for District No. 3 embracing the county of York outside of the city of Fredericton, and town of Marysville, beg leave to present the following report for the year ending December 31st, 1903:

The Board of Health again regrets that many of the monthly reports of physicians have been irregular and incomplete, thus rendering it impossible to give reliable statistics as to the extent of some of the diseases, and a termination of individual cases. The following table shows the number of infectious and contagious diseases reported during the year.

As was the case in 1902, the board had considerable smallpox to contend with last year. Up to the month of March the district was clear of the disease, but in the early part of that month, one Vincent Miller, who resided at Kingsclear, was discovered in the City of Fredericton to be suffering from smallpox. Having been present at the diagnosis of Miller's case, the chairman prevented this man being returned into this health district, and he was quarantined in Fredericton. The house in which Miller resided in Kingsclear was quarantined by the board. A few days later smallpox was discovered in four families resident at Springhill and vicinity and shortly after in a family at Upper Kingsclear. Quarantine was established in each case and every precaution taken to confine the disease within quarantined houses. Miss Flaglar, of St. John, a trained nurse, who had acquired considerable experience with smallpox during the epidemic in that city, was engaged by the Board and nursed through the Kingsclear epidemic. She rendered good and efficient service. One death occurred, that of a child of Stephen Robinson, two years old. The value of vaccination as a preventive was shown to a marked degree during the outbreak. Those in contact with the disease who were vaccinated escaped in every instance, while those in contact who refused, or could not for other reasons, be vaccinated contracted the disease. In all, twenty-one cases developed in Kingsclear and the quarantine on the last house was raised on 16th May.

On the 14th of April a single case of smallpox was discovered at Gibson, that of a young man who had recently returned from the lumber woods of Quebec. His house was quarantined and all the inmates vaccinated. Recovery was complete and no further cases developed therefrom. Owing to some difference of opinion as to the diagnosis in this case Dr. Lunn of Campbellton was called and he confirmed the diagnosis of smallpox.

On the first of May Dr. Beaudrey, chief health officer of Quebec province and a recognized expert in smallpox, was brought to this district by the provincial government for the purpose of ascertaining beyond doubt the nature of the disease which had been heretofore treated in this county as smallpox. Dr. Beaudrey examined the case at Gibson and those still under quarantine at Kingsclear and confirmed the diagnosis in each instance.

On the 27th of November last the board received notice from the attending physician of a case of chickenpox in a family of Nashtassie. At the instance of Councillor McFarlane this case was investigated by the chairman and by him found to be smallpox. The patient had recently returned from the Quebec lumber woods and doubtless brought the disease with him. Up to 31st December seven cases of smallpox have developed in the Parish of Douglas directly traceable to this case.

A few cases of unsanitary conditions were reported to the board during the year and prompt measures were taken to remove the cause of complaint.

From the reports of the health officers throughout the district it would seem that the sanitary conditions of houses and premises are generally satisfactory. Great attention is being paid to household sanitation and to providing a supply of pure water. In localities where milk is sold, the board would again suggest that there should be some inspection of its quality to protect consumers.

Eight meetings of the board were held during the year.

On the other hand, it is said that another body was substituted for that of Cromwell and that the protector was buried secretly on the Hambleton hills. At all events, at the top of Newburg priory there is a narrow room, one end of which is occupied by a mass of stone-work built into the wall. Here, it is said, the remains of Oliver Cromwell rest.
