COUNTY COUNCIL

(CONTINUED FROM FIRST PAGE.)

Coun. McManiman moved a resolution to the effect that the council ask the hospital authorities to amend their by-laws, so as to allow all doctors living in the city and county to join the medical staff. It was only a recommendation, he explained, and the trustees, could either reject or approve of it.

Coun. Morgan seconded the motion.

Coun. McFarlane expressed himself as being opposed to the resolution. He believed that young and inexperienced doctors should be made to earn their spurs before being placed on the hospital staff. It was important in the interests of the institution that we should have doctors well qualified for their work. He did not think it was within the power of the council to dictate to the hospital trustees as to who should be on the hospital staff.

Coun. McMullin agreed with Coun. McFarlane that the matter should be left with the hospital trustees to deal with.

Coun. Fawcett said that he felt that if the council gave the hospital a grant they should not hamper them by imposing any conditions upon it.

Coun. Cliff said the hospital trustees were honorable men and could be counted on to do what was right.

Coun. McMinnamin's motion was then put to the meeting and lost by a large majority.

County School Fund.

Coun. Grosvenor who was warden of the county last year submitted a lengthy report in regard to the negotiations carried on by him with the mayor of Fredericton, with a view of having the city contribute to the county schools. He told of the conference held by himself and the secretary-treasurer, with the mayor, and also about bringing the matter to the attention of the government. The result of this last action was that the mayor was called before the government to show cause why the law should not be carried out. The secretary-treasurer appeared on behalf of the county and the

matter had been fully threshed out, and the government had taken time to consider. The ex-warden suggested that the council should take such action as would ensure a settlement of the difficulty before another assessment is ordered for school purposes.

On motion of Coun. Murray the report was adopted.

On motion of Coun. Cliff the rules of order were suspended to enable councillors to speak on the county school fund question.

Coun. McMullin thought that instructions should be given to the warden and secretary-treasurer to take further action in the matter.

Coun. Grosvenor thought that the secretary-treasurer should be instructed to withhold his signature from the school warrants until action is taken by the government. The councillor read extracts from an editorial in the Herald, showing that the Fredericton high school was maintained at the expense of the city and free tuition was granted to pupils of the county. The Herald figured up that last year 51 pupils from the county received tuition, whereas had they been made to pay a fee, the total amount would have been \$1,020. In reply to this he pointed out that the city received the grammar school grant, which amounted to \$1000. He did not blame the Herald, for taking the matter up in the interests of the city, but he did not think that the proposition put forward by it was a fair one. Some attention had been called to an alleged agreement with ex Attorney General King, whereby the act was not intended to apply to Fredericton. If any such agreement had been made the county council was not a party to it, and were not therefore bound by it.
