A Montreal preacher characterizes the liquor saloon as "the vestibule of hell."

Lawyers and J. P.'s will be interested in the announcement that the consolidated statutes will be ready for distribution in three or four weeks.

A gentleman closely identified with the Grand Trunk Pacific railway project, characterizes as "all bosh" the Tory report that the company are seeking to rid themselves of the Quebec-Moncton section.

Col. Tucker, M. P., has been successful in his mission to Ottawa, the Government having agreed to do the dredging in St. John harbor necessary before more much needed steamship berths can be arranged.

Mr. R. B. Bennett, a former New Brunswick lawyer, now practising at Calgary, has declined the Tory nomination in that constituency, urging business reasons. His law partner is Senator Longheed.

Hon. Mr. Emerson left Ottawa today en route to Moncton, where a most enthusiastic reception will be given him tomorrow evening. The Conservatives of Westmorland are making no move to oppose his re-election.

Premier Murray of the Nova Scotia government announces a surplus for the past year of \$86,250. The revenue was \$1,243,581, of which \$619,234 was from royalty on minerals. The addition to the provincial debt for the year was \$999,161, of which \$823,983 went to aid railway development.

The reports respecting the condition of Mr. John Charlton, M. P., were exaggerated. His health is rapidly improving, and his physician declares that in six months Mr. Charlton will be as good as ever and will return to his constituents in North Norfolk with his physical and mental powers unimpaired.

The Moncton Times is tired of the Tory party in this province being ruled by the St. John machine and demands a party convention. The Times complains that that in the management of the party "too much dependence entirely has been in individual effort, and there has not been enough apparent disposition on the part of the leaders in this province to ask for the confidence and co-operation of the rank and file."

The County Council has increased its annual grant to Victoria Hospital from \$300 to \$600 per annum, but the members might very well have acceded to the application for \$1,000. The statistics presented by the trustees showed how largely residents of the county benefit from the hospital. However half a loaf is better than no bread, and perhaps on a future occasion the Council will deal more generously with this deserving public institution.

Mr. Tarte is now a good Tory in full fellowship with the leaders of that party. What a change. Three years ago during the federal election, Mr. C. H. Caban, the Tory candidate in Cumberland, observed in one of his campaign speeches: "There is, moreover, an element in the government of Canada today of whose purpose and methods Mr. Tarte is the chief exponent, who are not loyal to the best interests of Canada nor to the Empire, and the independent electors of this county cannot any longer afford to maintain him or the corrupt clique by which he is surrounded in a dominating position in the political affairs of Canada."

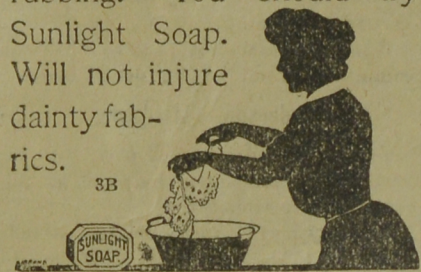

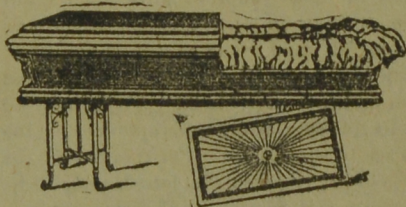
