SERIOUS FIRE AT GIBSON.

Mr. R. M. Bailey's Fine Barn Destroyed by the Flames With Most of its Contents.

While nearly seventy people were enjoying a parlor social at the residence of Mr. R. M. Bailey, Gibson, last evening, fire broke out in the rear of his large barn, and in a very short time it was levelled to the ground. The fire came so suddenly and was so unexpected that those near had to work like beavers to save what live stock there was in the building which consisted of fifteen head of cattle, six horses and nine hogs, eight of which were burned, along with fifty tons of hay, a large quantity of oats and other grain, two carriages, one a very high priced two seated vehicle, mowing machines besides several other valuable farming utensils. The ice house containing five quarters of beef and other provisions also went up in the flames. Great hardships and difficulties were experienced in getting out the horses and cattle and one man had a very narrow escape from a serious accident while leading his horse from the burning building. At one time during the progress of the fire it looked as if the whole lower end of Gibson would be swept out of existence, as at the rear of the barn which is one hundred feet long and 33 feet wide, are clustered several other buildings while the barn is connected with the house by a long shed which in order to save the house had to be partly pulled down. Mr. Bailey has also another barn partly finished, not more than ten feet from the burnt one, which had a very close call, and it is a miracle how it was saved, and if it had not been for the crowd that turned out from the social and formed a bucket brigade and checked the flames there is no knowing where the end would have been. While the men were working at the burning barn the women were clearing out the house, and even had all the carpets up and everything ready for a rapid exit.

Mr. Samuel Allen fell from the roof of the new barn a distance of about 18 feet and broke two ribs and was otherwise shaken up. He is being attended by Dr. H. H. McNally, and doing as well as can be expected. Mr. Roy Danphy, while carrying water, had both his hands badly frozen.

Mr. Bailey purchased this property from Robt. Macklin a little over a year ago, and with his family has been living there ever since. The origin of the conflagration is a mystery, especially as it started in the end of the barn where the hay is stored, and where nobody has been since the hay was put in last autumn. It looks as if it was the work of an incendiary, and the owner has his suspicions.

Mr. Bailey informed the Herald this morning that he estimated his loss at about twenty-six hundred dollars, with seven hundred and fifty insurance in companies represented by Frank I. Morrison.
